3 Suspects And \$1.5 Million Of Marijuana Seized

Industry - Industry Station deputies seized over \$1.5 million worth of marijuana and arrested three suspects that were allegedly selling marijuana in the City of Industry last week.

On Thurs., June 6, 2013, Special Assignment Deputies of

the Industry Station and detectives from Major Crimes U.S. Marshalls Fugitive Task Force arrested three suspects after conducting an arrest warrant surveillance operation.

After receiving information regarding the case, Deputies attempted to apprehend a parolee at large for cultivation for sales

of marijuana in the Industry station's patrol area, according to a LA County Sheriff press release.

During the surveillance operation, Deputies saw Suspect Luc An, 43, and two other men exit

Shooting Near Nogales High School

La Puente – On Monday, June 10, about 10a.m., the Sheriff's department reported that a two vehicle shooting happened at the corner of Altario Street and Gendel Drive, just a short distance from Nogales High School.

Police officials, stated that

Johnny Richards, 28, from La Puente, was fatally wounded.

Right after the shooting, one vehicle drove to the 18900 block of Northam Street, just around the corner from the high school. Medical assistance arrived, but Richards died at the scene. Another unidentified person was wounded and was taken to a

hospital. His status is currently unknown.

As a precaution, Nogales High School was placed on lockdown for a short time until it was deemed safe. Detectives investigating the shooting determined that there was no relationship to the school, and no arrests have been reported at this time.

Crime Recap

STAFF REPORTS

SGV – Crime in the local area has caused deaths, injuries, and car crashes in the surrounding cities. Here is brief crime recap from this past week.

On June 6, 2013, the on-ramp of the 60 freeway was closed briefly for a felony traffic stop of suspected burglars. Local reports state that deputies stopped a black Sedan at the Chevron gas station on Diamond Bar Blvd. Officials blocked the 60 eastbound on-ramp next to the gas station due to the felony stop.

On June 8, 2013 at around 2:30 a.m., a multi-vehicle crash caused the shutdown of the westbound I-10 freeway, west of the Indian Hill Blvd. exit ramp. A SigAlert was issued at 3:02 a.m. and canceled at around 5 a.m.

Reports state that the crash was caused by a Toyota Scion that was driven by Jonathan Sanchez, who was speeding west on I-10 in the middle lane. Sanchez apparently failed to slow down with traffic and struck a Cadillac in front of him. The impact of the crash caused the Cadillac to veer all the way to the right of the free-

way, where it struck a concrete wall. A passenger of the Cadillac was ejected from the vehicle and is in critical condition with two broken legs and broken pelvis at Pomona Valley Hospital.

Sanchez then spun in a counterclockwise motion into the left lane, where he struck the bumper of a Dodge Dart and then struck the concrete center median wall. Debris from the Dodge Dart collision flew forward and struck a Honda Civic in the left lane.

Multiple people were injured, including broken bones, a dislocated hip, head injuries, internal injuries, and one person needing to be airlifted from the scene.

On June 8, 2013, a 41-year-old man collapsed in front of a 7 Eleven store located at 1707 Indian Hill Blvd. in Pomona after being shot multiple times. Police

stated that the victim, identified as Shane McMillian, had been shot several times when officials found him. McMillian was airlifted to USC Medical Center, where he

was later pronounced dead.

Local students can change the world

ers and schools that inspire their excellence, helping to nurture tomorrow's scientists and engineers." The challenge is open to high school students (grades 9-12), who must select an environmental topic relating to energy, biodiversity, land management, water conservation, or air/climate cleanup. The teams are made up of two to four students, and an advisor/mentor. The challenge took place from September 13, 2012 to March 5, 2013.

Team ET (Energy Team) from Walnut High School, under the direction of teacher/mentor Jeri Braviroff, proposed to the Walnut City Council that installing LED (Light Emitting Diodes) street lights throughout the City would be a great ecological idea. Reports state that the Walnut City Council listened to the team's proposal and said they would have their staff look into the idea.

According to Team ET, as described on the Siemens Foundation website, "Our goal is to educate the public and our city on the implementation of the light-emitting diode, or LEDs, into city street lights. This phasing in of LEDs will reduce energy consumption and the probability of mercury poisoning among civilians and surrounding landscapes, reduce the amount of mercury that is released into the air through the burning of coal, and increase the environmental benefits. Subjective testing was done using CFLs, incandescents, and LEDs, comparing the general brightness and color output of the bulb. A positive relationship was found between the usage of less wattage and general brightness and color output."

Under the direction of teacher/mentor Jinasha Udeshi, Team Wildcats of Wilson High School in Hacienda Heights was also a finalist. They proposed to install a grass roofing to buildings which will reduce their carbon footprint

and decrease energy usage via better insulation. The green roof would also reduce costs and improve the surrounding air quality through photosynthesis. "A green roof provides a win-win situation for the environment and the user, possibly making it one of the best ways to have everyone help contribute to the fight against global warming," said Team Wildcats.

Finally, Diamond Bar High School had four team finalists, all under the direction of teacher/mentor David Hong. Team Bagsters placed collection boxes next to school trash cans for hard-to-recycle materials, like potato chip bags, to determine if awareness and knowledge affects whether people recycle or not. "Our team will compare the amount of potato chip bags recycled before and after an awareness campaign on recycling potato chip bags. The campaign will include a survey of 100 students on campus to determine if they know what products are recyclable, and if

given a convenient way to recycle, would they, and campus announcements," said members of Team Bagsters.

The second DBHS team, Eco Friends, developed special recycling bin tops that fit only bottles in an effort to prevent trash from mixing in to recycling. "This would make it easier for our school to sort through the bottles, if it decides to recycle them for money," said Team Eco Friends.

Team AQ2, the third DBHS team, installed water bottle refilling stations around the school, and encouraged the use of reusable bottles versus plastic. "By reducing our school's overall plastic bottle usage and reliance, we can save an estimated amount of 12,500 plastic bottles from our school every year," said Team AQ2.

And finally, the last DBHS team, Steampunk Machiavellians, determined the school could reduce energy for metal and aluminum production by

using fewer staplers. "We want to reduce the amount of metal used in our school by persuading teachers to use fewer staplers. By doing so, we believe that we can change the world by reducing the amount of energy used for metal production and for processing of the aluminum used in staplers and staples. If all goes well, then our impact in the school will be significant and that's the change we would

love to see," said the Steampunk Machiavellians.

Congratulations to all of our local high school finalists. Your eco-friendly ideas will definitely help to make positive changes in our world.



Human trafficking charge

and Gustavo Romero Clemente, 35, both of Anaheim, are each charged with one felony count of human trafficking, one felony count of pimping, and one felony count of pandering by procuring. If convicted, both defendants face a maximum sentence of 20 years in state prison. Romero and Clemente were arraigned last week post-preliminary hearing and are being held on \$500,000 bail. They are scheduled for a pre-trial setting conference on June 26, 2013, at 8:45 a.m. at the Central Justice Center, Santa Ana.

Prior to December 2012, Romero is accused of being acquainted with 29-year-old Jane Doe in her hometown in Mexico and giving her money when a family member became ill. A few weeks later, Jane Doe was unable to repay the money and Romero is accused of telling her that he could smuggle her into

the United States to work at a clothing store to pay off her debt. Romero is accused of arranging for Jane Doe to be smuggled into Southern California by way of Texas. He is accused of failing to set up a legitimate job for the victim.

Between Dec. 24, 2012, and Jan. 24, 2013, approximately one month after arriving in California, Romero is accused of moving Jane Doe into a room in Clemente's Anaheim apartment. Once in Anaheim, Romero is accused of ordering Jane Doe to prostitute herself to repay the debt. When Jane Doe resisted and refused, Romero is accused of physically beating the victim on numerous occasions including strangling and punching her, burning her leg with a fork, and beating her with a belt. The defendant is accused of causing bruising to Jane Doe's face and forcing her to wear makeup to cover the bruises.

Romero and Clemente are

accused of isolating Jane Doe by limiting her to weekly or twice-weekly phone conversations with her family in Mexico and monitoring all of her calls. Clemente is accused of watching and guarding the victim while Romero was away to prevent her from leaving the apartment and escaping.

Romero is accused of obtaining "clients" for Jane Doe and dictating the amount of money she would charge for various sex acts. Both defendants are accused of collecting payment from the sex purchasers.

In January 2013, Jane Doe was able to call 911 using a cell phone left behind in the apartment by one of the defendants while Romero and Clemente were arguing outside of the apartment. The Anaheim Police Department (APD) responded to the scene, located the victim, and arrested the defendants.

In November 2012, California's anti-human trafficking Proposition 35 (Prop 35) was enacted in California with 81 percent of the vote, and over 82 percent of the vote

in Orange County, to increase the penalty for human trafficking, particularly in cases involving the trafficking of a minor by force.

Under the law, human trafficking is described as depriving or violating the personal liberty of another person with the intent to effect a violation of pimping or pandering. Pimping is described as knowingly deriving financial support in whole or in part from the proceeds of prostitution. Pandering is the act of persuading or procuring an individual to become a prostitute, or procuring and/or arranging for a person to work in a house of prostitution. Deprivation or violation of the personal liberty of another includes substantial and sustained restriction of another's liberty accomplished through force, fear, fraud, deceit, coercion, violence, duress, menace, or threat of unlawful injury to the victim or to another person, under circumstances where the person receiving or apprehending the threat reasonably believes that it is likely to be carried out.

The Orange County District Attorney's Human Exploitation And Trafficking (HEAT) Unit targets perpetrators who sexually exploit and traffic women and underage girls for financial gain, including pimps, panders, and human traffickers. The HEAT Unit uses a tactical plan called PERP: Prosecution, to bring justice for victims of human trafficking and hold perpetrators responsible using Prop 35; Education, to provide law enforcement training to properly handle human trafficking and pandering cases; Resources from public-private partnerships to raise public awareness about human trafficking and provide assistance to the victims; and Publicity, to inform the public and send a message to human traffickers that this crime cannot be perpetrated without suffering severe consequences.

This case was investigated by APD and Deputy District Attorney Daniel Varon of the HEAT Unit is prosecuting this case.

tessori's name successful. The school also aims to feel like home to its students.

"A lot of parents like the school because it feels like home," Assistant Director Denise Stephens said. "We're not a new school, we're not high-tech; we want children to feel like they're at

home."

Walnut Valley Montessori incorporates the Montessori teaching method that was created over 100 years ago. The doctor who started the first Montessori schools studied the development of children from physical, mental and emotional aspects.

"It's everything coming together," School Director Pam Koby said. "Children are allowed to

progress at their own pace. The teachers have time to sit down with children on an individual basis and work with them on whatever problem they're having."

Koby, who has been a Montessori teacher for 40 years, said that students are taught a wide variety of not only academic skills, but practical life skills such as concentration and self-esteem. Children are instructed in

five major areas including practical life, sensorial, language, math and science. There are also opportunities to learn art, music, dance, sign language and other cultural topics.

"There are very rich academics for kids," Koby said. "It's fun for them. They don't even know they're learning because it's so much fun for them."

Students are also taught the importance of manners and respect, as well as how to resolve conflicts amongst others.

"Respect and manners are very important here," Koby said. "We go by Montessori's motto of 'We do not do for the children what they can do for them-

selves.'"

Walnut Valley Montessori's classes are small with a 10:1 ratio of students to teachers. The school is open to all children, including infants, no matter what their academic progress through the sixth grade. They also welcome preschool children that are not potty trained.

"I love what I do," Koby said. "I love seeing children who are exceptional and able to meet their potentials."





vide some relief to Rosa Parks and Clara Barton Elementary schools. A temporary, albeit necessary, fix to be sure; but the long term solution of additional schools to meet the needs of the growing community of Eastvale still needs to be addressed.

Corona Norco Unified School

District (CNUSD) owns the property adjacent to Half Moon Park (south of Chandler and west of Archibald) dedicated for construction of the new Yorba Elementary School. According to Ted Rozzi, Assistant Supervisor of Facilities for CNUSD, additional state and local funding is needed for the \$25 million project to complete construction and

fund the new technology that is needed district-wide. He said there are some state approvals that will expire soon. A portion of the work will need to be completed this year, with grading to begin in the fall.

Rozzi added, "We are in line for state funding next year, and local funding will help. If there is enough support for the schools and it all

works right, the district will pass the local bond in 2014, and the school will open in July of 2015."

Local reports also stated that an additional unnamed school is being evaluated for the North West portion of Eastvale, which still has homes under construction. CNUSD is looking to implement another school bond to complete this school.

3 suspects and \$1.5 million of marijuana seized

a residence in the 16400 block of Quarter Horse Rd. in Moreno Valley. Suspect An was arrested

at the scene for parole violation and suspicion of cultivation for sales of marijuana.

After confirming An lived at the residence on Quarter Horse Rd., reports state that Deputies

conducted a search of the residence and discovered the home concealed a large marijuana grow operation.

Deputies reported that they recovered 417 marijuana plants

in various stages of growth and \$100,000 worth of hydroponic equipment being used to cultivate the plants, such as numerous ultra violet lights and water pumps.

Deputies also developed information which led to the arrest of two additional suspects: Ed-

die Tran, 21, and Johnny Yuen, 22, both from the San Gabriel Valley.

All three suspects were transported to the Industry Sheriff's Station. Yuen and Tran are being held on 50,000 dollars bail, while An is being held without bail.

President for Student Affairs Doug Freer.

"We have made it clear to students in a multitude of ways that hazing is illegal, and we have zero tolerance for it in any manner," Freer says. "While many organizations on campus have done good work to reflect on and modify old practices, this organization unfortunately chose to go in a different direction. As such, they are no longer recognized at the university." While the fraternity is under suspension, its members may not sponsor campus events, hold group meetings, or use items bearing the

fraternity's trademarks, symbols or name.

If Sigma Nu is permitted to return to campus, it will be in coordination with the national organization and recruitment may begin, at earliest, July 1, 2019. The fraternity will also be placed

on probation for one year following the re-colonization of a new chapter. Individuals within the fraternity are going through the disciplinary process and will face disciplinary action that could include case dismissal, warnings, probation or suspension.


