SGV – Unfortunately, small businesses in the surrounding area are continuing to close.

Bella Napoli Trattoria & Pizza recently shut its doors due to a health and safety violation. The restaurant, located at Valley Blvd. and Grand Ave. in Walnut, received a Notice of Closure posted on its doors from the Los Angeles County Public Health Department.

Specific health code violations at the Trattoria are not known,

but the City of Walnut stated that the owner’s had recently sold the business.

A new pizza establishment is coming soon to that same location. Pieology, an Orange County-based franchise, is in the planning stages to open its doors in Walnut. If you’re not familiar with Pieology, their website states they have a corporate mission of “Making the world a better place one pizza at a time.” They

Chino Hills Tehachapi Project Issues

Chino Hills – State laws require Southern California Edison (SCE) to provide a minimum of 33% of its power from renewable sources by 2020. In compliance with this law, they have devel-

oped the Tehachapi Renewable Transmission Project (TRTP), building nearly 173 miles of new and upgraded high-voltage transmission lines to transport electricity from wind farms and other electrical generators from southern Kern County to the

substation located in Mira Loma. The project began construction in 2008, and is scheduled for completion in late 2015. The project will generate an electri-

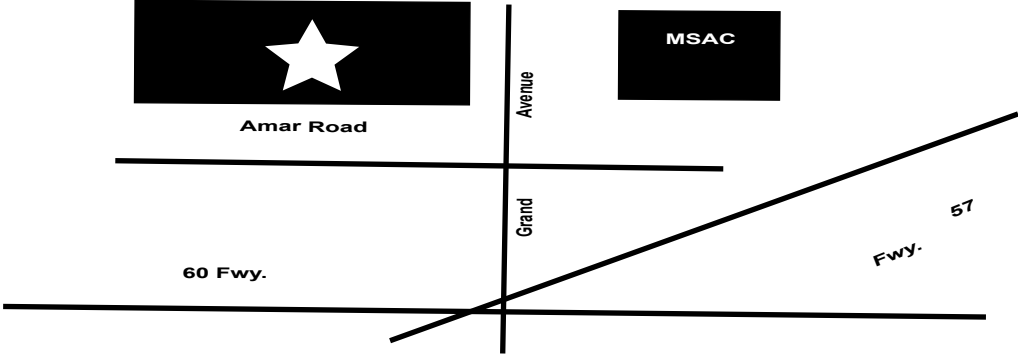

ment for crime-bail-crime, indicating that the defendants were out of custody on bail for another felony (2010 residential burglary case) at the time of the crime. If convicted, both defendants face a maximum sentence of nine years and four months in state prison. Gillard is out of custody on bail and his arraignment is to be determined. The People requested \$250,000 bail at Scally's arraignment on Monday.

An additional accomplice, Christopher Robert Butler, 28, Moreno Valley, is charged with one felony count each of possession of a controlled substance and smuggling a controlled substance into a correctional facility. He faces a maximum sentence of four years and eight months in state prison if convicted. Butler's bail is to be determined and he is expected to be arraigned today, Monday, June 17, 2013, in Department CJ-1, Central Jail, Santa Ana. The time is to be determined.

Scally is accused of being a pimp who exploited two young women for financial gain. Gillard is accused of being an aider and abettor to Scally. Pimps often establish rigid rules that their victims are expected to follow including setting daily quotas that the victims are expected to fulfill. Scally is accused of setting a \$300 quota for at least one of his victims on the night of the crime.

At approximately 4 a.m. on June 14, 2013, the defendants are accused of driving together in Santa Ana around Harbor Boulevard in an area known to law enforcement to be high in

prostitution and pimping activity. Gillard is accused of driving, Butler is accused of riding in the front passenger seat, and Scally is accused of riding in the back seat with two victims, ages 18 and 19 years old, who worked as prostitutes for Scally.

The defendants are accused of dropping off the victims on the street, where one of the victims proceeded to get into the vehicle of a sex purchaser. Undercover police officers from SAPD observed this behavior and performed a traffic stop on both the defendants' and sex purchaser's vehicles.

Butler is accused of being in possession of .4 grams of cocaine when contacted by the officers. Scally is accused of possessing evidence of pimping related to at least one of the victims. The defendants were arrested at the scene. Butler is accused of being in possession of an additional .7 grams of cocaine concealed on him when he was booked in the jail.

This case was investigated by SAPD and Deputy District Attorney Daniel Varon of the Human Exploitation And Trafficking (HEAT) Unit is prosecuting this case.

available for public view at www.sbcounty.gov.

The budget reflects the County's efforts to cope with the ongoing impact of the downturn in the economy. It also addresses future needs in infrastructure by investing in the repair and maintenance of roads, buildings and essential systems to avoid higher costs in the future.

"The County is committed to making the most of its funding to provide necessary public services in an effective and efficient manner and fulfilling its role in the achievement of the Countywide Vision," said the County's Chief Executive Officer, Gregory C. Devereaux.

"Despite the ongoing effects of the economic downturn, the County budget is balanced and incorporates major investments in key priorities, including road maintenance, public safety, and efforts to streamline the County's land use approval processes," Board of Supervisors Chair Janice Rutherford said.

Highlights of the 2013-14 budget include:

- A \$155.1 million increase in the 2013-14 budget's General Fund will go toward operational groups such as Human Services and Law and Justice to address state funded needs in welfare, employment services, foster care, and state prison realignment. A portion of the increase is to cover rising retirement costs in Law and Justice groups. Staffing is up by 366 positions in those departments as caseloads continue to grow along with the demands of implementing the Affordable Care Act and 2011 Realignment.
- The County is planning to revitalize the County Government Center campus and County office buildings and will allocate \$4.5 million to acquire existing office space near the Victorville Courthouse.
- \$700,000 for a one-time purchase of new permitting

software for Land Use Services allowing interfacing with Public Works and County Fire.

- \$360,000 is allocated for medical marijuana enforcement in the County.
- \$7 million for road and drainage improvements.
- Continued funding for the Sheriff/Coroner/Public Administrator's aviation operations move from Rialto Airport to San Bernardino International Airport (SBIA) and the Sheriff's Crime Lab expansion.
- Cost-savings resulting from agreements with the unions that represent various groups of County employees are projected to continue. Of the \$4.4 billion total budget, the County has discretion over the distribution of \$499 million. The rest of the money is mandated and controlled by state and federal law. The budget supports the Countywide Vision; measures progress on attainment of the Board's goals and objectives, allocates resources to core

responsibilities, and invests in infrastructure, facilities and basic operating systems.

The County's budgets have been honored by the Government Finance Officers Association for seven years in a row as

among the best in North America in terms of their clarity and completeness. The County of San Bernardino's award-winning budgets can be viewed at the County website, www.sbcounty.gov/cao/. The site includes rec-

ommended and final budgets dating back to 2001-02, as well as archived news releases, goals and objectives established by the Board of Supervisors, and the County Organizational Chart.

years. He was first elected to the Walnut City Council in 2002 and served twice as Mayor from July 2005 to September 2006. He was reappointed Mayor by the City Council on November 25th, 2009 for the third time and on April 24, 2013 for his fourth time. From 1999 to 2002 he served on the Planning Commission and served on the Parks and Recreation Commission from 1993-1999. He also chaired both Commissions prior to his election to the City Council.

At the June 12 Council meeting, many council members and members of the community shared their memories with King and thanked him for all the work he's done in the City of Walnut. King told the crowd that he still plans to stay close to the City.

Now that King will be retiring, the Council has three options:

have a special election, appoint someone to his seat, or keep the seat vacant, according to Management Analyst/Public Information Officer Fabiola Huerta.

Huerta said she isn't sure which option the Council is leaning towards, but she said the Council will discuss what they're going to do at the City Council meeting next week. Huerta also said that the public is welcome to come and give their input on

what they believe the Council should do, since special elections usually cost a lot of money.

The next City Council meeting will be held on June 26 at 7 p.m. at the Council Chambers in the new City Hall located at 21201 La Puente Road.

Another recent business closure is Christy's Donuts & Ice Cream, located on Brea Canyon Road in Diamond Bar. CitySearch.com lists it as "Reported Closed", but their building is vacated and their number has been disconnected.

Bob's Big Boy on Golden Springs Drive in Diamond Bar is also looking to save itself from closing by initiating a petition to make the building an historical landmark. Owner James Tsai

feels like their landlords are trying to force them out of the location they have been at for over 30 years.

Sometimes business turnover can stimulate the economy by making way for new companies to invest and grow in the community, and sometimes it's a sad nod to the state of the economy. Chino Hills Tehachapi Project issues

cal capacity of 4,500 megawatts, providing power for three million homes.

The City of Chino Hills, in a press release from June 11, stated that the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) recently issued two contrasting proposed decisions. The first issue is the proposed decision by CPUC Administrative Law

Judge, Jean Vieth, to lift the stay on construction of the partially completed overhead lines in Chino Hills. This would allow the lines to be completed as approved in 2009. While the underground lines have a high cost to rate-payers, the proposed route of the overhead lines are close to homes, schools and parks in some areas of the project.

The second issue, coming from Commission President Michael Peevey, is an alternate

decision that would approve the undergrounding proposal of the City of Chino Hills, including a 3.5 mile single circuit of cables that would be buried in concrete four to six feet underground within the existing SCE right-of-way. Transition stations would be built at the western and eastern ends of the line to connect them to the remainder of the overhead lines. The alternate decision has a cost of \$224 million associated with it, but the current burden imposed

on the community of Chino Hills is unfair, according to the press release.

The press release further stated that Chino Hills City Manager, Mike Fleager, is "...pleased that President Peevey has issued an Alternate Decision that would approve undergrounding, and we recognize that the CPUC Commissioners will have the final say on undergrounding the transmission lines." He looks forward to the City making its case to

the Commission during the oral arguments on June 26, evidencing the environmentally superior choice of undergrounding and the elimination of the negative impacts overhead lines have on the community, including health and safety, aesthetics, noise and property value concerns.

The full Commission will determine which decision becomes effective following a vote at a CPUC meeting scheduled for July 11.

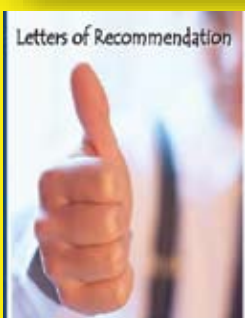
