New Changes, New Year In Local Schools

Walnut - Over 14,650 students began classes as the 2013-2014 school year began in the Walnut Valley Unified School District on Monday, August 19.

They came in carrying backpacks filled with pencils, erasers, notebooks and other tools to support their learning.

The first day of also marked the re-opening of the completely

remodeled Cyrus J. Morris Elementary School.

Before construction began, the entire school (students, staff, books, supplies and furniture) temporarily relocated to the former Ron Hockwalt Academies on Lemon Avenue in

Diamond Bar/Walnut Unemployment Down

STAFF REPORTS

Walnut – The Employment Development Department (EDD) reported that unemployment in Diamond Bar and Walnut has decreased from June to July. Diamond Bar is down from 7.9 to 7.7 percent. Walnut is down from 5.9 to 5.3 percent, giving it one of the lowest unemployment rates in L.A. County.

In an EDD Press Release on Friday, August 16, 2013, the state's unemployment rate was listed at 8.5 percent, a 1.1 per-

cent decrease since January. The unemployment rate for Los Angeles County was shown at 10.8 percent. Since last year at this time, non-farm-related jobs have increased by 61,800 in the county, which is encouraging.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics shows California ranking 45 out of 51 in the U.S., at 8.7 percent for July. North Dakota ranks first, with 3.0 percent. Rates are estimates based upon an equal percentage of the labor force, and these estimates provide key indicators of local economic

conditions.

According to the EDD, unemployment rates are based upon place of residence - where people actually live, regardless of where they work. Individuals working more than one job are only counted once.

The California economy is continuing to improve, a change we slowly started seeing back in 2010. Increases in the stock market and home prices, as well as growth motivated by technology, foreign trade and tourism have brought about improvements.

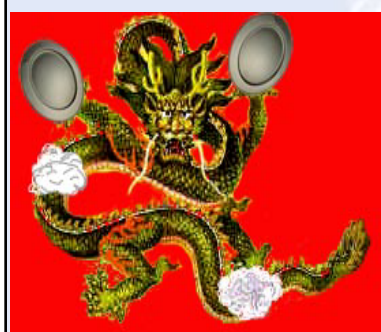

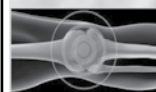

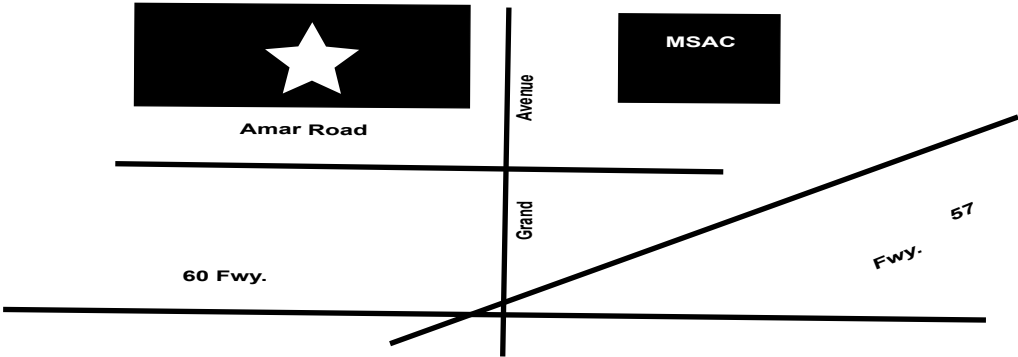

Crime Recap

This week in crime includes a truck dumping 100 gallons of human waste onto the road, a police chase, the sentencing of a woman involved in a hit and run, a fatal stabbing, and two accidents on the I-10, one of which was fatal.

On August 14, a truck carrying human waste from portable toilets tipped over on the 20600 block of Via Verde Street. The accident caused 100 gallons of human waste to spill out onto the street and into a storm drain. The spillage required multiple government agencies to step in and help contain the hazardous material. The truck driver was trapped inside the cab and suffered minor injuries in the crash.

On August 14, a police chase led officers from the City of Industry to West Covina. The chase began when officers tried to pull over a black Dodge Charger after suspecting him of being drunk. When the driver refused, a chase ensued. Shortly after, CHP officers joined the chase. The suspect surrendered and was promptly arrested. The suspect's identity has not yet been released.

On August 15, 22-year old Walnut resident, Ashley Lopez, was sentenced to 360 days in jail and five years of probation for her deadly hit and run back in November 2012. Lopez was arrested after she struck pedestrian, Cu Lee Nguyen, 80, with her car and fled the scene. Nguyen was crossing the street in Baldwin Park when he was

hit and killed. Authorities stated that after Lopez hit Nguyen, she fled the scene and did not try to give aid to Nguyen, who died at the scene. After an eyewitness identified the vehicle, local media assisted by passing the information throughout the city. With multiple leads, police were eventually able to find and arrest Lopez on November 5.

On August 17, police were investigating the stabbing death of a 29-year old male Hispanic, which occurred in the 1400 block of Gloriosa Avenue in Rowland Heights, on Saturday, August 17, 2013, at 1:26 a.m. The victim has been identified as Benjamin Cervantes, a resident of Rowland Heights. He was stabbed by his sister's boyfriend, Albert Camacho, a male Hispanic in his 30s, and a resident of Ontario. Detec-

tives have learned that the suspect and the victim were involved in an argument, which escalated with the suspect stabbing the victim several times in the upper torso. The suspect fled the scene but was arrested and booked for murder at the Walnut Sheriff's Station on August 17, 2013, at approximately 12:00 p.m. Sheriff's Homicide Detectives are not releasing the suspect's booking photo at this time. Detectives encourage anyone with information about this incident to contact the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's Homicide Bureau at (323) 890-5500. Finally, on August 20, two accidents occurred on the I-10 freeway within minutes of each other, causing one fatality, multiple injuries, and the closure of the I-10 freeway for a few hours. The first accident was a multi-vehicle crash involving four vehicles and a big-rig, causing injuries. At least one vehicle ended up under the rig, rupturing the fuel tanks and causing a large fuel leak on the freeway.

The second accident happened within minutes of the first and involved four more vehicles. This crash caused one person to die and three others to become injured. Both accidents contained victims who needed to be airlifted and caused a total of five minor injuries, four critical injuries, and one fatality.

closures. With decreased supply and an 800% increase in whole-sale pricing for the better part of 2000 in company with drought, economic fall-out was a given. Millions of businesses and consumers were affected.

One of the utility companies accused of overcharging during the crisis, British Columbia's Powerex, Inc. (a subsidiary of British Columbia Hydro & Power Authority), will pay \$750 million to settle market manipulation allegations in 2000 and 2001. The deregulation of the California electricity market, created by 1996 legislation, was taken advantage of by Powerex (and other companies), who purchased and exported enormous quantities of electricity to Canada, only to sell it back to California at excessive prices.

According to a Press Release issued by the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) on Friday, August 16, 2013, money from the settlement will be used to offset the future electricity bills of Pacific Gas & Electric, Southern California Edison, and San Diego Gas & Electric

ratepayers. DWR helped to end California's energy crisis in 2001 and 2002 by purchasing whole-sale electricity under long-term contracts on behalf of the three California utilities.

Once approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, the settlement will help to offset the monthly bills of millions of Californians. This is such a positive outcome, and one that has been a long time in negotiation. The DWR Press Release also states that over 50 settlements have been reached with various sellers that will result in nearly \$4 billion in refunds to ratepayers.

time, requiring a pavement and concrete base replacement of over two feet. Caltrans say the new surface will provide a smooth, safer drive for motorists, reduce time required for maintenance and minimize the need for further lane closures. The project is funded by the State Highway and Operations Protection Program (SHOPP) and is expected to be complete in late 2014. Starting Friday, Caltrans will replace the No. 3 and No. 4 eastbound SR-60 lanes between Fullerton Rd. and Nogales St. The lane closures in detail are as follows:
From Fri., Aug. 23 at 10 p.m. to Mon., Aug. 26 at 5 a.m., two lanes of the eastbound 60 will be closed as well as these on-ramps: Hacienda Boulevard, Azusa Ave., Fullerton Rd., and south Nogales St. These off-ramps will also be closed: Fullerton Rd. and Nogales St. However, the SR-57 and

SR-60 connector will remain open. Full freeway closures in the eastbound direction between Nogales St. and Fullerton Rd. will be in effect on Sat., Aug. 24 from 1 a.m. to 5 a.m. and on Mon., Aug. 26 from 1 a.m. to 5 a.m. for concrete barrier removal. Caltrans recommends avoiding the area if possible, using a public transit, or planning a different route using their map app at quickmap.dot.ca.gov/. If you know you will be traveling on the 60 freeway during the construction, Caltrans encourage you to bring water, snacks, medications, and entertainment for children

because the delay is expected to be long. As a reminder, a reduced speed limit of 45 mph is always in effect within construction work zones. If traveling through the construction, remember to slow down, pay attention, and watch for signs advising of traffic shifts and other important information. tempted murder with premeditation and deliberation, torture, and child abuse, with a sentencing enhancement for causing great bodily injury to a child under five years old. He faces a maximum

term of 13 years to life in state prison at his sentencing, Sept. 27, 2013, in the North Justice Center, Fullerton. The time is to be determined.

In October 2011, Robey had a two-month old son, Baby Doe, with his girlfriend of two years. He lived on and off with his girlfriend

and her mother in Anaheim until three weeks prior to the attempted murder, at which time he began living in a motel in Costa Mesa.

On Oct. 18, 2011, Robey was at the home of his girlfriend and her mother and had agreed to babysit Baby Doe. Without the defendant's knowledge, his girlfriend set up a hidden camera in the home because she believed

him to be cheating.

While alone with Baby Doe and solely responsible for his care, Robey violently abused and attempted to murder the infant. He wrapped a blanket around the baby's neck, picked him up by lifting the ends of the blanket like a noose, and swung the victim around for over a minute.

Robey laid Baby Doe back down and punched him several times in the chest with closed fists. On multiple occasions he strangled, slapped and punched the baby and grabbed the victim by the throat with both hands, lifted him in the air, and violently shook him.

At one point while Baby Doe was crying, Robey covered the victim's mouth with his hand, grabbed him by the neck, and shook him in the air. He attempt-

ed to suffocate Baby Doe by covering the victim's face with a blanket and covering the baby's mouth with his hand for several seconds. He also covered the victim's nose and mouth with tape to suffocate the baby.

The baby's mother discovered the abuse upon watching the video from the hidden camera. The girlfriend's mother learned of the video the following day and took the baby to the hospital. Hospital staff contacted the Anaheim Police Department (APD), who investigated this case.

Robey was arrested at a motel in Santa Ana by APD officers that night. Baby Doe suffered fractured ribs, bleeds to the brain, and liver injuries.

Deputy District Attorney Barrie Pink of the Family Protection Unit is prosecuting this case.
