## DB Woman Arrested At Massage Parlor

**Chino** - A Diamond Bar woman was arrested, along with two other women, for allegedly taking part in a prostitution service at a Chino massage parlor.

Last week, Ting Kang, 30, of Diamond Bar, was arrested on suspicion of pimping, pandering, and maintaining a place of prostitution. Mie Ja Sim, 61, of Hawaiian Gardens, was booked

for allegedly aiding in prostitution and Xochitl Garduno, 25, of Moreno Valley, was arrested on suspicion of engaging in prostitution.

The women were arrested and booked into the West Valley Detention Center in Rancho Cucamonga.

The prostitution investigation started when detectives received a tip that Nana's Massage Therapy, located in the 5400 block of

Philadelphia St. in Chino, was possibly being used for prostitution. The business was said to be found on an adult erotic massage parlor website. The officers obtained a search warrant and seized evidence associated with prostitution and pimping.

## Bill Ensuring Accountability Within Repossession Industry

**Sacramento** — This week, Assemblyman Curt Hagman's (R-Chino Hills) AB 791, which improves certain aspects of the repossession industry and its relationship with the public, was signed into law by Governor Jerry Brown.

"AB 791 provides additional protections for both consumers and licensed re-possessors regarding how re-possessors legally recover property," said Assemblyman Hagman. "This new law will allow for smoother transactions between re-possessors, agencies, and the public, while also increasing

accountability within the profession."

Assembly Bill 791 updates provisions of the Collateral Recovery Act to provide clarity to current codes while addressing issues pertaining to the activities

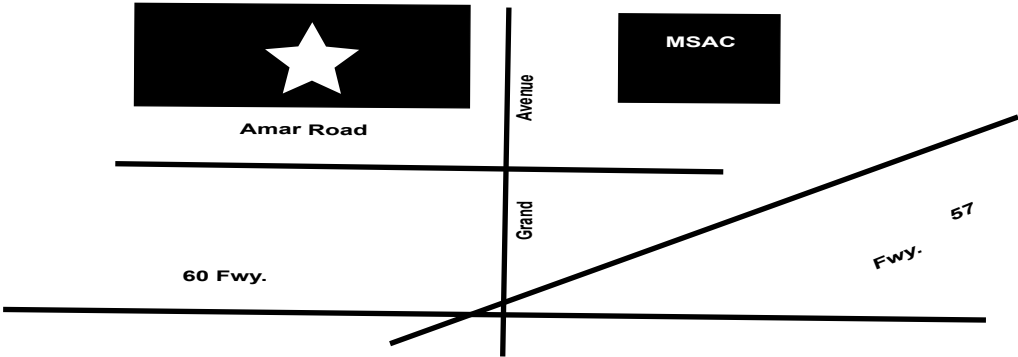

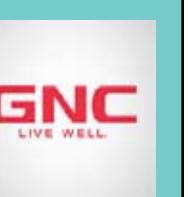

# Crime Recap

## STAFF REPORTS

This week in crime includes two women killed in fatal car accidents and the Madre fire.

On Sept. 21, a woman was killed after a fatal accident. The unidentified victim was between 25 and 30 years old and was

killed at the interchange of the Pomona and Orange freeways in Diamond Bar. The accident occurred when a vehicle slowed in the carpool lane. The vehicle was rear ended and the driver drove off to park in a safe location to call CHP officers. The accident caused the closure of the carpool lane and three left lanes.

On Sept. 22, another woman

was killed when her vehicle rear ended vehicle, causing a four vehicle crash on the 60 freeway. The woman was identified as Kathy Cortez and she was driving a Nissan Versa. Cortez rear ended the vehicle when she failed to see the vehicle ahead of her slowing down. Cortez then struck an SUV which struck another car, causing that vehicle

to hit a third vehicle. Paramedics rushed the driver and passenger of the first car to a nearby hospital for minor injuries and a helicopter airlifted Cortez to a nearby medical center where she was pronounced dead.

On Sept. 23, a fire started north of Azusa and has been designated the Madre fire. The fire burned over 250 acres of land. The fire prompted up to 450 firefighters to help fight the blaze.

# CNUSD seeks bond

up short from the state. Yorba Elementary is located at the southwest tract of homes near Chandler and Archibald, next to Half Moon Park, and would relieve the extensive overcrowding this young community has encountered.

"Yorba Elementary has the funding from the school district but is lacking the matching funds from the state," said Kelly Bruce and Evita Gonzales from CNUSD at the June 12, 2013 Town Hall Meeting. The District will start some initial work in October but will not be able to complete construction until the funds are delivered from the state, or are paid for by the bond initiative, they added.

CNUSD had proposed a bond initiative last year, but changed their minds after other initiatives hit the ballot.

"Do we need a bond? Absolutely," Thomas Pike, Assistant Superintendent for Executive Services, said in an interview with Eastvale News last August. "The board feels additional time is needed to continue studying what options will be best for students, the timing of the measure and to assess whether the necessary resources exist to effectively manage a campaign," he had added.

The currently proposed \$299 million 30-year bond measure would also be used to upgrade facilities, build new schools and update technology resources within the District's 49 schools.

The District had identified three major issues for consideration on that proposed bond measure and sought feedback from the local community.

CNUSD was interested in 1) providing funding for instructional technology improvements such as infrastructure and student/teacher devices, 2) providing funding for continuing facility improvement projects at older elementary schools and all intermediate schools throughout the district, and 3) establishing a technology fund to support annual upgrades, new purchases and maintenance.

"Funding for these technology improvements at schools district-wide would ensure instructional equity for all students," said Ted Rozzi, Assistant Superintendent of Facilities.

This year it appears they are seeking the same feedback as registered voters were sent last week a "Back to School Update" slash "Tell Us What You Think" questionnaire, targeting seven direct questions and asking the voter to rate "HIGH, MED, or

LOW."

"Please rate the importance of the following school priorities," the prepaid mail in card read. "Update classrooms for career and technical education; Repair/replace aging school roofs, floors, walkways, lighting and wiring; Improve energy efficiency to save money; Upgrade technology in classrooms, libraries, and science labs; Improve student safety and security; Repair/upgrade outdated classrooms and schools; and the final question: Relieve student overcrowding."

In addition to the proposed bond for next year, taxpayers are currently paying for another bond passed seven years ago.

In November 2006, the voters of CNUSD approved Measure U, a \$250 million general obligation bond for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities at CNUSD. If you have any questions about Measure U passed in 2006, please call the Facilities Division office at (951) 736-5045.

The level of annual taxation a voter might support, and the importance of other issues facing the community are expected after the survey results are compiled. Those conducting the surveys will also note how individuals prioritize the need for a school facilities bond, and gather general demographic data.

Once polling results are reviewed and any additional community outreach is complete, the CNUSD Board of Education would need to call a bond election for the November ballot no later than July, unless its

proposed for an earlier election. The time frame for a resolution to be passed is about 4 months prior to an election, explained Assistant Superintendent Ted Rozzi.

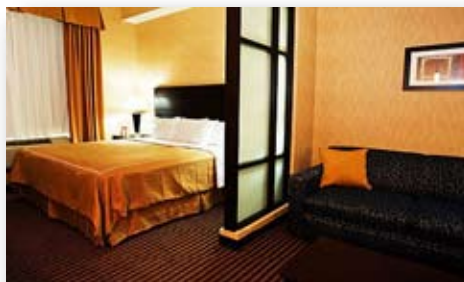

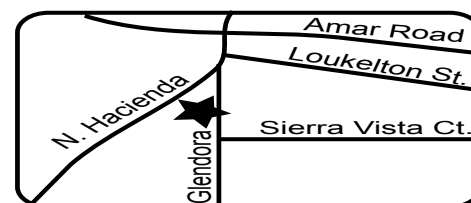

## Chaparral Students Get a Lesson in City Planning

**Diamond Bar**—Chaparral Middle School students learned about urban planning from City of Diamond Bar officials on September 12.

Mayor Jack Tanaka and Public Information Coordinator Cecilia Arellano were invited to speak with 60 students in the Design-Based Learning (DBL) core.

They met in one of the four connecting state-of-the-art classrooms that feature loft-high ceilings, exposed pipes and skylights located in the school's new science wing that opened in August.

The 6th grade inquirers were anxious to learn these important details from the experts because they are building their own cities.

The guests talked about urban planning and the role of the city council and mayor. Arellano also shared the history of the city that was formally the Diamond Bar Ranch and how it eventu-

ally became a master-planned residential community.

"In the 1960's Transamerica promoted Diamond Bar as a place to go to get away from the city," she said.

"One of my favorite parts is being able to meet with people, coming to classes like today hearing young and fresh ideas and hearing what everyone is thinking to improve the city," Mayor Tanaka said.

"There's no better city to be living in. Diamond Bar features numerous recreational activities, programs, parks, sports and very outstanding schools," Tanaka said. "We're at home here," he added.

The Mayor shared how the monitoring and cycling of city lights aids when inclement weather or any other conditions arise that cause extra traffic on our streets.

Science and math teacher Maggie Strand said all the kids were shocked when they learned the percentage considered open

space also includes parks in the city while they were plotting their cities.

The Mayor fielded numerous questions including what are the future plans for the city? How much does a new light post cost? Is there a water tower in the city? How much does a landfill hold? What should we expect to see in our city when we become adults and are raising our own families in 10-20 years? Do you ever get a day off? Have you met any celebrities? Do you always wear a tuxedo?

"The kids asked a ton of questions because they are building their own cities. Today's lesson definitely provided a deeper understanding for what we are trying to do," Strand said.

Design-Based Learning integrates hands-on work, problem solving, collaborative teamwork and innovative creative designs.

"This year, the 6th grade program is incorporating more Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM)

with the Future City Competition," said humanities teacher Sherry Robertson.

Students are designing and building functional virtual cities using SimCity software and will be constructing scaled down models in coming months.

"Students become mayors assigned with the job of developing functional cities with populations of 50,000. They plan residential zones and build roads for the virtual cities," Robertson said.

They also create three-dimensional models, write narratives with the history of their cities, along with several additional content area activities. The project culminates with the Future City Competition at regional and national levels.

"The beautiful thing is that the design challenges tie directly into our standards. When we teach about a concept, our students immediately have background knowledge to attach the new

learning to resulting in long-term learning," Robertson said.

For example, we learn in Social Studies that Mesopotamia had issues controlling their water source that led to one of the first known irrigation systems, she explained.

"The students connect with this issue because one of the first problems they must solve in Sim-City is to decide where and what their water source is going to be. If they make the wrong choice, they could possibly pollute their source or tap it dry, causing people to leave and bankrupt their city," she said.

## Taxpayers Net Savings in Rowland Unified School District

Voter-approved bond measures in Rowland Unified have funded modernization, safety improvements and new construction projects at schools throughout the District, which serves residents of Rowland Heights, West Covina, Walnut, La Puente, and the City of Industry. The District's facilities improvements will continue with the construction of new classroom buildings at Rowland High School, Nogales High School and Stanley G. Oswalt Academy.

The bonds were assigned strong ratings of Aa2 / AA- by national rating agencies Moody's Investors Service and Standard

& Poor's respectively. The ratings reflect the District's stable tax base, healthy reserve levels and a history of prudent fiscal management. Investors responded favorably to the District, based on the ratings as well as the District's performance in previous bond financings.

The District continuously monitors its outstanding bond debt to identify refinancing opportunities to save money for local taxpayers. The next series of bonds eligible to be refinanced is the Election of 2006, Series A, which should generate attractive taxpayer savings in approximately two years.

have a Tree board or department, a tree care ordinance, a community forestry program with an annual budget of \$2 per capita, and an arbor day observance and proclamation in order to become recognized as a Tree City USA.

After the proclamation, Mosquito and Vector Control District Public Information Officer Kelly Middleton made a presentation to City Council members and Walnut residents concerning the dangers and prevention of West Nile Virus.

It was noted in the presentation that during 2002, there were 150 confirmed cases of West Nile Virus in Los Angeles County and that every precaution should be taken to ensure the safety of Walnut residents.

Middleton stated that dealing with West Nile Virus can be limited by removing still water from around one's home. An abundance of still water would make an ideal breeding ground for mosquitoes.

"So when we tell people to check their yard for standing water, this is the reason why," said Middleton. "It's an ongoing issue because they have a very fast reproduction and life cycle and a population of mosquitoes can go from a couple of hundred to several thousand in a week's span of time."

While most cases of West Nile Virus have mild symptoms ranging from headaches to fevers, Middleton said that one in every 150 people who contract West Nile Virus become severely ill and become hospitalized to treat diseases such as encephalitis and meningitis.

of licensed repossession agencies. The three major concerns AB 791 addresses are confidentiality of licensee information, appropriate authorizations for licensed repossessioners, and proper identification. This bill will help prevent misunderstandings, protect personal privacy, and ensure repossessioners act only within the oversight of their profession.

Following Middleton's presentation, the Founder and Director of the Walnut Valley Symphony Orchestra, Nové Deypalan, announced open auditions for both the symphony orchestra and chorale on Oct. 5-6 at the Walnut Senior Center.

Public hearings were then opened up for discussion for the introduction of Ordinance no. 13-07, which deals with the Walnut municipal code for reasonable accommodation in the City's land use and zoning regulations for disabled persons pursuant to fair housing laws and ordinance no. 13-08, which establishes regulations for density bonus and incentives for affordable housing developments in accordance with state density bonus laws.

The council then approved all three items on their consent calendar, which included resolution no. 13-49 (a resolution of the City of Walnut allowing certain claims and demands in the amount of \$935,692.81, demand no. 144139 through no. 144221), the installation of speed humps on Temple Ave. with an approximate cost of \$20,000, and the alcoholic beverage license application for Real Sichuan Cuisine Inc.

However, before the approval of the installation of the speed humps on Temple Avenue, City Engineer David Gilbertson gave a brief presentation to explain the need of the speed humps at the insistence of 65 percent of the area's residents.

While local homeowners were adamant about placing the speed humps, Gilbertson noted that not everyone in Walnut is on board for the future speed humps on Temple Ave.

"An ongoing issue with emergency access, fire department, has been not in support of speed bumps throughout the city," Gilbertson said.

Gilbertson noted that even with the hesitation of emergency responders, the council could

still approve the construction of the speed humps since they meet the criteria necessary for approval.

Council Member Mary Su was vocal about her support of the speed humps based on past traffic collisions that have happened in the area and the need of safety for drivers and pedestrians.

The City Council meeting then held a brief Housing Authority Meeting which approved resolution no. 13-09 (a resolution of the City of Walnut allowing certain claims and demands in the amount of \$21,504.08) and the appropriation of \$10,000 from the Walnut Housing Authority Fund Balance to account no. 41-5850-6216 (Professional Services) for the Generation of CEQA documents related to the Walnut Housing Element Update.

After the approval of the two items, City Council then went into a closed session to discuss the residential complaints about a brightly colored house at 602 Pacer Ct. and the homeowner's filing a discrimination suit against the city.

# Twelve convicted

Jimenez Ochoa, 28, of Santa Ana, Jonathan Ramirez, 28, of Santa Ana, Pedro Roman, 42, of Irvine, Misael Sanchez, 44, of Lake Forest, Juan Daniel Soto, 30, of Santa Ana, Jose Rosario Velasco, 64, of Santa Ana, Mario Velazquez, 31, of Santa Ana, each pleaded guilty on Sept. 23, 2013 to one misdemeanor count of agreeing to engage in prostitution. Roman also pleaded guilty to one misdemeanor count of driving a vehicle without a valid license. The defendants in this case were sentenced to three years of informal probation, 10 days in jail with the possibility of CalTrans in lieu of jail, donations to the Victim/Witness Emergency Fund, and must submit to AIDS testing and education.

On July 16, 2013, the defendants drove up to an undercover officer, whom they believed to be a prostitute, near the area of 1400 East First Street in Santa Ana. The defendants agreed to engage in sex acts with the officer for a price ranging from

\$20 to \$100. The defendants and the victim arranged to meet in a motel and were arrested by officers from the Santa Ana Police Department (SAPD). The defendants in this case were arrested as part of a covert operation by SAPD in which 12 defendants were arrested for soliciting sex.

The area of 1400 East First Street in Santa Ana is known to law enforcement to be a high-prostitution area and is known to frequently be used by individuals who sexually exploit and traffic women and underage girls for financial gain, including pimps, panderers, and human traffickers.

These cases were prosecuted by the Orange County District Attorney’s Human Exploitation And Trafficking (HEAT) Unit, which targets perpetrators who sexually exploit and traffic women and underage girls for financial gain, including pimps, panderers, and human traffickers. Commercial sex trafficking is the second most lucrative criminal enterprise behind narcotics trafficking. Often the perpetrators are gang members and/or career criminals.

The HEAT Unit also targets

defendants who create a demand for prostitution by soliciting and purchasing sex, which increases the commercial sexual exploitation of women and children. The HEAT Unit uses a tactical plan called PERP: Prosecution of human trafficking perpetrators and sex purchasers; Education for law enforcement to properly handle human trafficking and pandering cases; Resources to raise public awareness and provide assistance to the victims; and Publicity to inform the community about the problem and notify human traffickers and sex purchasers that this crime cannot be perpetrated without suffering severe consequences.

The OCDA announced in April 2013 that he will publicize the names of defendants convicted of sexually exploiting women or children by soliciting sex acts as part of the campaign to reduce the demand for human exploitation and trafficking.

These cases were investigated by SAPD and Deputy District Attorney Michael Bardeen of the HEAT Unit prosecuted these cases.
