Walnut's Latest Expenditures Over \$831,000

Walnut - The City of Walnut spent more than \$10,000 in animal pest management and control and more than \$8,000 on fitness and recreation instruction as part of an \$831,000 disbursement in warrants to various contractors, instructors

and services during the last pay period ending in September, as detailed in a resolution approved at the latest city council meeting held Oct. 23.

Resolution 13-52 outlined the expenditures which also included a warrant in the amount of \$5,839 to Veronica Tam and Associates, a Pasadena based

consultant providing clients with housing and urban planning services. At the meeting, the council heard public testimony and city staff reports introducing amendments to existing laws in order for

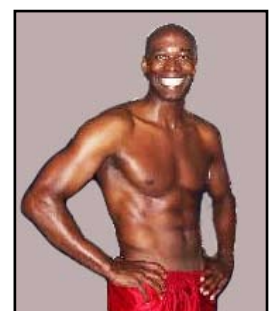

WeTip Caller Helps Chino PD Combat Drug Activity

Chino - A WeTip caller assisted Chino Police Officers by reporting drug related activity occurring at multiple residential locations in the City of Chino.

The information, which was anonymously provided to the Chino Police Department by WeTip in January of this year, led Officers to conduct an investigation which included the subsequent execution of two search warrants. As a result of the investigation, four subjects were arrested for

drug related charges.

At the conclusion of a WeTip investigation and related court proceedings, the information provided in the tip is given a rating which determines whether or not the tip qualifies for a reward. This tip was rated a 10 on a scale of 1-10; because of the high rating, caller 560889 may receive their reward by contacting WeTip with the code they were given during the initial call.

mous WeTip Hotlines: (800) 78-CRIME, (800) 47-ARSON, (800) 47-DRUGS and (800) US FRAUD. These lines are staffed by trained, bi-lingual operators and are available to anyone in the United States.

WeTip has assisted the Chino Police Department with numerous valuable tips and has aided law enforcement as a whole with 546,579 tips, 16,028 arrests, 8,245 convictions, and over \$330 million worth of illegal drugs and narcotics have been seized. There has been nearly \$24 mil-

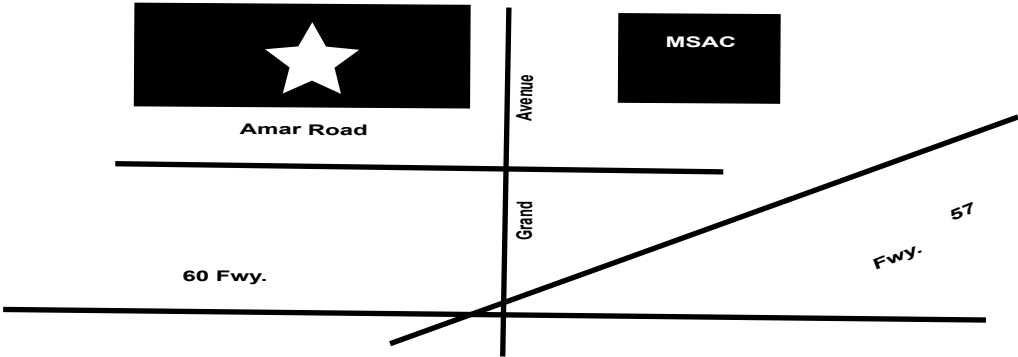
lion worth of stolen property and cash recovered in these cases. WeTip has paid \$986,165 in rewards to anonymous callers over the past 36 years. WeTip works

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Five Arrests For Internet Child Porn

LA County - A six week investigation by a Los Angeles County Cyber Crimes Task Force has culminated in the arrest of five suspects in a wide ranging case involving the possession and distribution of child pornography over the Internet.

On Wednesday, Oct. 23 and Thursday, Oct. 24, task force members served search warrants at homes in South Los Angeles, Palmdale and Fullerton, and businesses in the Cities of Baldwin Park, and Whittier. Evidence linking the suspects to the distribution of child pornography was recovered from each of the locations.

The first four suspects who were arrested are identified as

19-year-old Rolando Garcia of South Los Angeles, 43-year-old Mario Aburto of West Covina, 72-year-old Jon Johnson of Fullerton, and 53-year-old Soraya Solimano of Palmdale. Rolando Garcia, Mario Aburto and Jon Johnson were arrested for suspicion of possessing and distributing child pornography. Soraya Solimano was arrested for suspicion of possessing a controlled substance.

A fifth suspect, 52-year-old Gregory MacClean of Palmdale, was arrested on Friday, Oct. 25 for possession and distribution of child pornography. Suspect MacClean had previously fled when investigators attempted to contact him at his workplace in Whittier, and then failed to show up at a pre-arranged meeting

with investigators. He then turned himself in on Friday.

The Los Angeles County Cyber Crimes Task Force consists of Los Angeles County Sheriff's Deputies, as well as members of the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This investigation was conducted with the assistance of the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. ICAC was started by the United States Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, in 1998. Its primary goals are to provide state and local law enforcement agencies with the tools to prevent Internet crimes against children, to encourage multi-jurisdictional cooperation,

and to educate law enforcement, parents, and teachers. The ICAC task force seeks to identify distributors of child pornography on the Internet, whether delivered on-line or solicited on-line and distributed through other channels, and to apprehend sexual predators who solicit victims on the Internet through chat rooms and other methods. Currently all fifty states participate in ICAC.

In this case, investigators proactively sought out persons offering to distribute child pornography on the Internet. Once sources were identified, investigators then actively downloaded videos and photos from the sources. After confirming it was illegal child pornography, investigators determined the locations from which the images were distributed, then linked

them to the suspects who were doing the distributing. The arrests followed. The investigation is continuing.

Hundreds of photos and videos of children between 1 and 16 years old engaged in sex acts with adults were recovered by investigators. There is an ongoing effort to identify and help the children who are victims of these crimes, and who are believed to be located throughout the world.

LA County Fire Promotes Carbon Monoxide And Space Heater Safety

LA County - As November brings chilly weather to Los Angeles County, local residents switch off air conditioners and turn on furnaces to stay warm. Also, as energy costs rise, families are turning to space heaters as a less expensive alternative for keeping their homes warm. But gas furnaces and space heaters bring new safety concerns. In 2010, home heating equipment was involved in an estimated 57,100 reported house fires and 490 civilian deaths in America, according to the National Fire Protection Agency. Stationary and portable space heaters accounted for 32 percent of reported home heating fires – and 80 percent of the deaths resulting from them.

The Los Angeles County Fire Department is asking all residents to prevent home heating fires by having all fuel-burning heating equipment inspected by a professional every year. This includes the fireplace, furnaces, water heaters, wood stoves, coal stoves, space heaters, portable heaters, and even the chimney. Make any needed repairs before use. Throughout November, carbon monoxide and space heater safety tips will be shared on the Fire Department's Facebook, Twitter and YouTube pages, and its website at www.fire.lacounty.gov.

"Did you know that in California, it is now the law that every single family and multi-family home has a working carbon monoxide detector installed?" says Assistant

Fire Chief Dave Stone. "These detectors should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Carbon monoxide is called the 'silent killer' because it is invisible, odorless and colorless. Without a carbon monoxide detector, you are placing yourself and your family at great risk. Exposure to undetected high levels of carbon monoxide can be fatal. Symptoms of poisoning include headache, nausea and drowsiness."

In addition to ensuring your family's safety from carbon monoxide poisoning, it is equally important to use heat sources safely to prevent fires and injuries.

"All heaters need some space," says Chief Stone. "Keep anything that can burn at least three feet

away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater. Have a three-foot 'kid-free zone' around open fires and space heaters. Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel-burning space heaters. And make sure to turn off heaters when you leave the room."

While winter in Southern California is about the only time to enjoy your home's fireplace, residents should take action to prevent all types of home heating-related fire dangers. As temperatures continue to cool down, make sure that everything is working properly before their first seasonal use. Don't risk your life trying to take the chill off!

exclusively vote for candidates within their residential boundary. As CNUSD explores the adoption of establishing trustee areas, they have sought the feedback of the community about the proposed drafted trustee area maps. This change, if approved, would go into effect with the elections in November 2014, where members of the Board of Education will only be elected by voters who reside in the areas that the board members are elected from.

Using Data from the 2010 census, a private consulting group, in collaboration with the district, created election areas that would be roughly equal in population and in compliance with state law, the Federal Voting Rights Act, and the United States Constitution. Three conceptual trustee area scenarios have been created that divide the district into five areas and these have been presented to the community for feedback during four different meetings held last week throughout the Corona-Norco area.

Participants were encouraged to ask questions, view information on boundaries and view a short presentation on the process.

CNUSD presented the considerations for the trustee areas at these meetings so that the community would understand the process and what is required for this to happen. First, each area would need to contain a nearly equal number of inhabitants. Second, each area is drawn to comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act. Third, each area must represent more than one jurisdiction/high school boundary. Finally, the areas must be compact and contiguous, respect communities of interest, respect incumbency and follow man-made and natural geographic features.

At last week's Eastvale Town-hall Meeting, CNUSD Board Member, Bill Newberry, and Ted Rozzi, Assistant Superintendent of Facilities, shared some of the results of those meetings with Eastvale residents. According to Newberry, it appears that in early 2014 we will most likely be going in the direction of dividing the

population into five trustee areas. This means that by the November 2014 elections, each area will be electing a school board member from their own area to represent them in the school district. The trustee draft maps can be viewed on CNUSD's website at www.cnusd.k12.ca.us, under Trustee Area Public Forums.

According to authorities, Amaya approached the 19-year-old store clerk at Peck Mini Mart at 4164 N. Peck Road, and then left the store. Amaya later returned to the store when the clerk was locking up and allegedly forced his way into the door. Amaya then barricaded the entrance door and allegedly dragged the store clerk into the back where he sexually assaulted her multiple times before leaving the store.

Amaya was later arrested and charged with two counts of forcible rape, three counts of sexual penetration by a foreign

object and an allegation that he kidnapped the 19-year-old to commit those crimes. Amaya was arrested with a five million dollar bail and if charged, faces 125 years to life in prison.

On Oct. 31, a man was arrested with allegations of shooting at a police officer on the 60 freeway. According to authorities, the suspect was about to be pulled over by officers when he opened fire and sped off. The suspect's vehicle was then stopped further

down the freeway in a transition lane and the unnamed suspect was arrested. The suspect faces attempted murder charges on a peace officer.

On Nov. 2, deputies found 150 marijuana plants being grown in a Rowland Heights home. The discovery of the plants prompted

the arrest of one suspect identified as Raul Villa, 23 of Rowland Heights. Villa was arrested on suspicious behavior when the house was discovered, according to authorities. Villa is being held at the Walnut Station on 50,000 dollars bail and was arraigned on Tuesday, Nov. 5.

An investigation determined that May embezzled nearly \$40,000 over a six year period beginning in July 2006, by forging numerous checks. According to court documents, the theft went undetected be-

cause May kept custody of the Community Club records. However, a review of financial books and records in June of 2011 found the Club in perilous shape, with thousands in unpaid bills, temporary loss of

non-profit status, bank fees, and a substantial loss of funds. May was taken into custody by Walnut/Diamond Bar Sheriff Station's detectives on March 5, 2013.

In addition to probation, May

had to pay a court ordered judgment, will serve 150 hours of community service, and was sentenced to two days in county jail, with time served. You can bet that more stringent financial controls over the Community Club funds have been implemented.

Walnut's latest expenditures over \$831,000

Walnut to become compliant with state laws regarding fair housing elements.

Walnut's Interim Finance Director, Marie Santos, said the funding for the \$831,000 in payments does not come from the City's operating budget, but rather, funding depends on the specific expenditure and area of need.

"There are different funding sources for each individual expenditure," said Santos, adding that residents don't vote or give input on spending, but that expenditures are passed at the city council's discretion.

"The City makes sure that we have this information available to our residents," said Santos.

Lorraine Martinez, a resident in the city for more than 37 years, said she attends city council and planning commission meetings and said that information is hard to locate on the City's web site. Martinez also felt that some of the terminology used at meetings needs to be clarified to residents.

"It's not explained in layman's terms, I feel it's at a much higher level and it makes it difficult to follow, even for someone like me, who has a college education," Martinez said. "Also, there's a language barrier. I know some of our residents who don't speak English as well have a hard time getting their point across." Martinez was in attendance at the Oct. 23 meeting.

"As a Walnut resident, I would think that since everything re-

garding funding has been tightly shut and monitored since the government shutdown, we don't have a voice on [city spending]." She said. "I can't say if it's frivolous spending, but I don't think residents have enough input. I don't feel there's enough information; I really feel it is out of our control."

Walnut, which is similar to many other cities in the San Gabriel Valley, is a contract city, meaning municipal services are provided via contract arrangement with other units of government and agencies or private and commercial organizations. Santos added that some of the contracted services are monthly expenditures, while others depend on the length of the contract, or the duration of serviced provided

as in the case of classes and instruction.

When the City spend more than \$10,000 on pest control, Santos said she didn't feel Walnut had a pest-control problem beyond the need to contract the county for animal control services and to do routine maintenance on all city zones. Documentation made available by the City details animal control services contracted for various locations throughout the City including city parks.

One of the city's biggest expenditures was on instructors, recreation and community services. Among these: a tennis instructor who teaches at least 13 different classes and is paid close to \$2,000 for his services; a teacher of Kindergarten readiness classes who was paid close to \$3,000 last month for a five-week session; and a whale watching trip in Orange County totaling in \$600.

Cindy Ruiz, a member of the

board of trustees at Walnut Valley Unified said the city offers programs based on the needs of the community and that the Community Services classes offered by the City may differ greatly from kindergarten readiness classes offered by the school district.

"Parents could be involved, some may come part-time, others full time, and it could include child care. The instructors the city hires are usually independent contractors teaching short-term classes, it's what the community wants," she said. Ruiz added that the City offsets some of the costs by charging residents for the programs, classes and services offered.

Tommye Cribbins, City Clerk for the City of Diamond Bar said a city's expenditures in regards to contractors and consultants are specific to each city department. "We are probably not too different than Walnut since we are a contract city."

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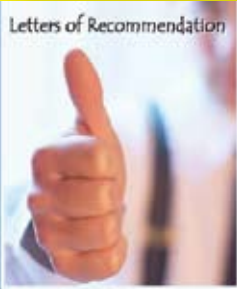


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
