Eastvale City Council Recap

Eastvale – The City of Eastvale held two City Council meetings for the month of March. The first meeting occurred on Mar. 11, beginning with a closed session at 6:30 p.m.

During the closed session, there was a Public Employee Appointment for City Manager. City Attorney, John Cavanaugh, stated that on a 5-0 vote, the Council approved an agreement for Interim City Manager Services with Michele Nissen. In the conference with legal counsel, Cavanaugh stated that there was

Silverlakes: Back In Action

Norco – Think back to a year ago, when the Silverlakes Equestrian Center hit another barricade on a long and bumpy road. Since the project began construction in 2007, it seems like one thing

after another has prevented the 122-acre recreational facility from being completed. The story – from financing issues to mistrust and lawsuits – has had a lot of drama.

On Thurs., Mar. 5, Eastvale's Mayor Ike Bootsma announced

Old Schleisman Road Closure

Eastvale - On Nov. 13, 2013, the Eastvale City Council adopted Resolution No. 13-38 to vacate a portion of Schleisman Road, east of Scholar Way, as a public street. This vacation is a result of the realignment of Schleisman Road between Scholar Way and Hamner Avenue through a new roadway constructed by the D. R. Horton development, also known as "A" Street. The resolution was recorded on Feb., 24, 2014. The project was previously approved by the County of Riverside in 2007, prior to the City of Eastvale's incorporation.

The new roadway is nearing completion, and the intersection of Schleisman and Scholar was closed to all traffic beginning on Mar. 27. This change allowed for the permanent closure of Schleisman Road east of Scholar Way, and the transfer of east/west traffic onto the new Schleisman Road beginning on March 29.

Major construction will continue for several weeks to allow for paving, striping, and signage installation. During this time, an interim



detour and traffic control plan will be implemented to direct vehicular as well as pedestrian traffic.

D. R. Horton subdivision map, Tract No. 34014, includes the renaming of "old/existing" Schleisman Road as Riverboat Drive, to match the current street name east of Wells Spring Street. Consequently, the new roadway referred to as "A" Street that terminates at Hamner Avenue will be renamed Schleisman Road.

The City of Eastvale has been working diligently with the developer, D.R. Horton, and the Corona-Norco Unified School District (CNUSD) to prepare and plan for the traffic impacts during construction. A Traffic Engineer has been retained to prepare traffic control plans for various

phases of construction. Property owners within the surrounding neighborhoods were informed in early March when over 2,000 notices were mailed to advise residents of the name changes. To date, no objection has been received at City Hall.

Once the project is completed, the end result will be a significant improvement to the traffic and circulation in the area of Schleisman Road and Scholar Way. At completion of the project, benefits will include:

1. Fully improved and widened intersections, which will reduce existing congestion at Schleisman Road and Scholar Way

2. Sidewalks on the east side of Scholar Way, which will enhance pedestrian safety by improving crosswalks and pe-

destrian paths.

3. Scholar Way will have two lanes in each direction between Schleisman Road and Citrus Street.

Construction is unavoidable, but the City of Eastvale, D.R. Horton and CNUSD have planned to make the most of any downtime during construction such as holidays, weekends and after-peak hours. Please expect delays when driving through the project area. Residents are encouraged to allow extra time for any activities in the immediate area, or use an alternate route.

no reportable action.

After the closed session, the meeting moved into presentations and announcements. The Council thanked Acting City Manager, Robert Van Nort, for his service to the City of Eastvale and presented him with a gift. There was a Public Safety Commission update provided by Chair, Sean Parilla.

In the Public Comment and Citizen Participation section, resident Howard Feng discussed a recent article pertaining to birthing homes. Glenda Chavez from Waste Management stated that Eastvale's recycling all-stars will be given recognition at the Apr. 8 Council meeting.

The Consent Calendar passed 4-0. The Council meeting minutes were approved from the regular meeting held on Feb. 25. The proposed regulations for Electronic Message Signs to be placed at schools, parks, and other locations were approved on the second reading and adoption of the ordinance.

There were no Public Hearings or Old Business announcements.

For New Business, it was recommended to enter into a software agreement with Accela for Land Management Solutions; and a contract with Woolpert for Accela Software implementations, data migration and training. Interim City Manager, Michele Nissen,

summarized the staff report, and a representative from Accela gave a PowerPoint presentation. The motion carried 5-0.

Acting City Manager Van Nort introduced the Fiscal Year 2015-16 Annual Operations and Capital Improvement Budget. Ana Montoya provided a PowerPoint presentation with goals and objectives. The motion carried 5-0.

There was no City Manager's Report.

For Council Communications, Councilman Joe Tessari thanked Acting City Manager Van Nort and the staff for all their hard work. Mayor Ike Bootsma discussed the recent opening day ceremonies for the Eastvale Girls' Softball League and Eastvale Little League. The meeting adjourned at 7:37 p.m.

The second Council meeting was held on Mar. 25, and began at 6:30 p.m.

There was no closed session.

During presentations and announcements, it was noted that Council may recognize citizens and organizations that have made significant contributions to the community, and it may accept awards on behalf of the City. There were two Certificates of Recognition received by Michael Osborn and Sharyn Link. There were also Foreclosure Program and Community Foundation updates, and upcoming City events were posted.

The Student Liason report was given by ASB President, Jakob Rivera.

For the Consent Calendar, Council meeting minutes from Mar. 11 were approved. The Warrant Register was approved and submitted by the Finance Department. Funds are available for the payment of the warrants for a total of \$1.3 million, and a payroll amount of \$135,000. The Joint Community Facilities Agreement between the City of Eastvale and the Jurupa Community Services District was approved.

There were no Public Hearings and Old Business items.

Under New Business, the D.R. Horton, Final Map 34014, to adopt a resolution to change Schleisman Road to Riverboat Drive between Scholar Way and Wells Springs Street; and "A" Street to Schleisman Road between Hamner Avenue and its westerly terminus, was presented. Recommendations were given to select a date to hold a preliminary budget hearing.

The meeting was adjourned and the next City Council meeting will take place on Wed., Apr. 8, at Rosa Parks Elementary.

DUI Checkpoint Results

Eastvale - The Eastvale Police Department conducted a DUI/Driver License checkpoint on Fri., Mar. 13, at Limonite and Hamner avenues, between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 3:00 a.m. Checkpoints are placed in locations that have the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence and provide the greatest safety for officers and the public.

DUI/Driver's License checkpoints have been shown to lower DUI deaths and injuries. A major component of these checkpoints are the deterrent effects they have on those who might drive alcohol or drug impaired, bringing about more awareness and encouraging everyone to use sober designated drivers.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), checkpoints have provided the most effective documented results of any of the DUI enforcement strategies, while also yielding a considerable cost savings of \$6 for every \$1 spent. 90 percent of California drivers approve of checkpoints.

Operation Results:

- 1,213 vehicles passed through the checkpoint
- 3 DUI arrests
- 5 field sobriety tests for DUI of alcohol/drugs
- 5 Citations were issued for unlicensed drivers
- 1 Citation was issued for suspended driver license
- 5 Citations for miscellaneous vehicle code violations
- 4 Vehicles towed

Drunk driving is a major cause of fatal and injury collisions each year. We are seeking your assistance in saving lives. If you are on the roadways and you observe a possible drunk driver, call 911 immediately. Officers will be dispatched to the location and make every effort to prevent the impaired driver from continuing to pose a threat.

The Eastvale Police Department wishes to remind you that if you choose to drink alcoholic beverages, please designate a sober driver before getting into a vehicle. Remember, "Drunk Driving, Over the Limit, Under Arrest!"

Bicycle Helmet Enforcement

Eastvale - On Tues., Mar. 24, the Eastvale Police Department stepped up their bicycle safety enforcement with a focus on minors riding bicycles, scooters and skateboards without wearing safety helmets. Parents are reminded that Vehicle Code Section 21212(a) states that every person under the age of 18 must wear an approved safety helmet when riding these modes of transportation.

The results of this enforcement included 66 citations issued to juveniles in violation of the safety code.

Bicycle fatalities are rising in California as more people use bicycling for commuting, exercise and recreation. Locally, the Eastvale Police Department has investigated 1

fatality and 30 injury collisions involving bike riders during the past year. In 2012, California witnessed 124 bicyclist deaths, while nationally 726 riders were killed.

Nationally, fatal bike crash patterns have changed markedly. The percentage involving adults age 20 and older increased from 21 percent in 1975 to 84 percent in 2012. The percentage involving males increased from 82 percent to 88 percent during this period; and adult males comprised 74 percent of all bicyclist deaths in 2012. The percentage of deaths occurring in urban areas climbed from 50 percent in 1975 to 69 percent in 2012.

The following safety tips can save lives and stop this tragedy witnessed far too often in Eastvale. Drivers:

- "Share the road" with bicy-

cists.

- Be courteous; California law now mandates at least three feet of clearance when passing bike riders.
- Look for cyclists before opening a car door or pulling out from a parking space.
- Yield to cyclists at intersections and as directed by signs and signals.
- Be especially watchful for riders when making turns, either left or right.
- Bicyclists:
- Wear properly fitted bicycle helmets every time you ride. If under 18 years of age, it's the law.
- A helmet is the single most effective way to prevent head injury resulting from a bicycle crash.
- Riders are considered vehicle operators; you are required to obey the same rules of the

road as other vehicle operators, including obeying traffic signs, signals, and lane markings.

- When cycling in the street, cyclists must ride in the same direction as traffic.

• Bicyclists should increase their visibility to drivers by wearing fluorescent or brightly colored clothing during the day, and at dawn and dusk.

- To be noticed when riding at night, the law requires a front light and a red reflector to the rear.

• For additional safety, use a flashing rear light, and use retro-reflective tape or markings on equipment or clothing.

Active School Shooters Are Not "Campus Visitors"

Securing school campuses around the country has become a major point of contention, with each side of the debate entrenched in the fact that they believe their ideas are the best and most reasonable. But the first thing school systems need to do is to stop designing protection plans as if active shooters are merely visitors to our campuses, when, in fact, they are killers at large.

Both sides do have some degree of support in their respective circles of influence, and in some cases, what each side is proposing just may work on a small, district-sized scale. For instance, I often hear gun rights advocates supporting the idea of arming teachers as one of the most effective means of protection for our children while at school. While this approach may have some effect on the active shooter, that shooter would have to encounter the armed teacher who is adequately trained to square off and stand in the line of fire with an armed intruder, and fire well-placed, consistent shots under pressure. If all of those factors can be achieved then there is room for a measure of success.

However, in my professional opinion as a former police officer and current worldwide protective specialist, training a teacher to that level of proficiency may require more instruction

than most teachers or school systems are willing to dedicate. On the other hand, I do support the deployment of more armed school resource officers and directed police patrols as a way to help in the deterrence of armed violence. But in most cases, there are just not enough police professionals available to make a noticeable difference in the response times needed to make this approach effective as anything other than highly visible window dressing.

Then we come to the other side of the debate that insists on increased video surveillance, key card scanners, mental health legislation, limited entry and exit ways, metal detectors, student badges, etc. Now, all of these things can make a difference - if used correctly all of the time, maintained in proper working order, are fully funded, and are used in conjunction with armed security staff. We must remember that active shooters or armed intruders do not follow the standard protocol of using designated entry ways, nor do they wear badges that can be scanned, or stand in line to be processed into the school campus, or even really care about the presence of school video surveillance systems. Active shooters arrive on our campuses with one single-minded purpose: to inflict as many causalities as possible in the shortest amount of time before the arrival of highly trained, paid and competent security professionals.

And while the argument continues to rage about who is right or wrong, or best suited to draft policies that mitigate the loss of life and property damage on our school campuses, the active shooter is only doing one thing: planning their next attack regardless of school policy, procedure or practice.

The active shooter will engage our children while they stand outside in perfect lines to be processed into our wholly unsecure campuses. The active shooter will do the evil deed of killing our children while being watched by the overpriced, high-definition camera systems that our school systems have purchased to watch and record the murder of our children. And afterward, parents, educators and security professionals will launch into the debate about what to do.

I recently learned that a school system in this great nation came to the conclusion that the best way to deter a school shooter is to simply "move the doors on each of its campuses to a new location within the building." I am supposing that this idea will somehow confuse the shooter and cause them to just forego their intent? I shook my head in disbelief while read-



ing the article, and wondered just how idiotic we as a society have become. And don't get me started on one Alabama school district's idea of simply having its children "throw canned goods at its armed intruders," what poppycock.

The answer to our questions is extremely simple. Let's no longer debate the issue about the so-called "militarized look of our campuses," as we already have that in place in nearly every school in the country with our high wire fences, armed security staffs, metal detector entry points, roving armed patrols, locked metal gates, key carded entryways and high frequency radios. Let's simply utilize the current technology in place today. Passive ballistic protection products are on the market which are already offered to police officers, food service workers, airline pilots and bank employees. This low visibility and high protection option has become the gold standard for protecting against gun violence around the world. Passive ballistic protection works. Debate over.

Helpful Tax-Saving Strategies

Millions of Americans face a challenge in meeting their budgets every month – not just financially, but also in their time budgets, says investment advisor, Reid Abedeen.

"Knowledge is power and time is often money, but what if you don't have the time to empower yourself with knowledge? For many households, that often means losing out on thousands of dollars through tax deductions," says Abedeen, a partner at Safeguard Investment Advisory Group, LLC (www.safeguardinvestment.com).

"As a family man myself, I understand what it means to work hard to provide the best possible for my wife and children. Had I not worked in the financial sector for almost two decades, I might not have understood how to best troubleshoot my tax return, I sympathize."

Abedeen offers the following strategies that may be relevant for your family this tax season.

• Take tax deductions for capital loss. If your capital losses exceed your capital gains, the

excess can be deducted on your tax return and used to reduce other income, such as wages, up to an annual limit of \$3,000, or \$1,500 if you are married filing separately. However, you may deduct capital losses only on investment property, not on property held for personal use.

• Fund your retirement to the max. You can contribute up to \$5,500 to an IRA in tax-year 2014, or \$6,500 if you are age 50 or older. Workers in the 25 percent tax bracket who contributed \$5,500 to an IRA would save \$1,375 on their 2014 tax bills. You'll want to check your eligibility and understand the deadline for the 2014 deduction. If you make a deposit between Jan. 1 and Apr. 15, you need to tell the financial institution which year the contribution is for.

• Advisory fees are tax-deductible. Don't feel like spending money to save and make money? There's a workaround. Before closing the door on the possibility, inquire with a financial expert. Most are happy to give a free initial consultation, and you don't have to be a millionaire to make it worth your while.

• Gift assets to children. You don't even have to file a gift tax return on an asset that's valued less than \$12,000, which is not taxable. If the fair market value of the gifted asset is more than \$12,000 per person per year, but less than \$1 million, there is the requirement of filing a gift tax return, but you won't be taxed. The gift still is not income taxable to the recipient.

• Deduct a home-based office when used for your employer. If space in your home is used exclusively and regularly for a trade, you can count that as a deductible. Calculate the square footage of your home office and divide the area of your office by the area of your house. If the percentage is 14 percent, for example, that represents the percentage of your total home expenses that can be allocated toward the home office deduction. For further questions, consult a professional.

"You'll want to be very vigilant regarding these details of these deductions," Abedeen says. "For any questions, I seriously recommend consulting a professional."

in September."

As construction began once again on the barren field the week of March 9, interest has been renewed on the sports park that will ultimately contain an equestrian center capable of stabling and hosting world-class (possibly Olympic) events, 25 soccer fields, a 5,000-seat indoor stadium, an outdoor arena and event center, picnic areas, and more. This beautiful sports mega-center could also bring in over \$35 million to the City of Norco, and attract over a half million visitors...a boon for Norco, and Eastvale as well.

Steve King, Planning Director for the City of Norco, said that

the project has definitely been approved. "Synthetic and natural grass fields will be the first phase, along with some sand equine arenas," he said.

The sports fields will be finished for use this year, and then other phases will commence construction thereafter.

Balboa Management Group, which has been at the helm (albeit on and off again) of construction for more than seven years, has secured \$20 million in financing, according to the City of Eastvale.

Despite the ups and downs of Silverlakes, it's not difficult to become re-enamored with anticipation over what is to come. Citizens throughout Eastvale and Norco – and far beyond – will enjoy watching the construction process and look

forward to enjoying the first fruits of the park come September.

As Eastvale's Interim City Manager, Michele Nissen puts it, "Norco's Silverlakes project has been a long-time coming, and we are happy to see the project start moving forward again. Once this project is complete – assuming it is built out as planned – the regional benefits will be tremendous. Invariably, there will be temporary construction inconveniences to Norco and Eastvale citizens, which go hand in hand with a project of this scope and magnitude. This is a very exciting development that is poised to positively impact the trajectory of both cities."

Well said. This is definitely a project, that when completed, will place our communities in a more prominent place on the map.





Local Heroes Save A Life

CPD Officer and Good Samaritans rescue driver from burning car

Corona – On Thurs., Mar. 5 at about 11:53 p.m., the Corona Police Department dispatched an Officer to the 1100 block of E. Foothill Parkway regarding a vehicle fire.

Upon arrival, Officer Michael Neff observed a white Ford Escape crashed into a tree with its engine compartment fully engulfed in flames. Two citizens were

Phone Call Scam Alert

Riverside – It seems as if fraudulent phone calls are on the rise, and uninformed victims may find themselves short on funds and long on disappointment.

According to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, criminals are impersonating law enforcement officials, utility company personnel, and even county court employees, making random calls and threats in an attempt to extort money.

In one scheme, a victim is told that they have an outstanding warrant for failing to appear for jury duty. In another scheme, the caller threatens to shut off utilities for past due payment or the installation of a new meter. The caller would demand payment via credit card or Green Dot card. The suspect would typically remain on the phone with the victim while the money is transferred.

While these suspects are very convincing, the Riverside County Sheriff's Department and the Riverside Superior Court District make it very clear that they will never contact the public in such a way.

If you find yourself a victim of one of these calls, never, ever, provide any type of payment or personal information. Tell the caller that you are going to contact the company they "represent" directly to resolve the situation. If possible, write down any incoming numbers from your Caller ID (although many of today's technologies can hide or scramble phone numbers) and as much information as possible. Hang up and contact your local law enforcement.

to share his passion for fitness with the community.

"First, surround yourself with great people who are passionate about the goal. Next, only run teams that you're willing to be personally invested in. The rest mostly takes care of itself."

What Randall is expounding on is success. Orangetheory's group training approach is based on science, using a heart rate monitor to inspire performances. Because they focus specifically on getting each student into their "Orange Zone," a spike in metabolism occurs that lasts 24 to 36 hours after the session is completed. This "after-burn" has given Orangetheory quite the reputation for burning calories.

Randall, who has 26 years of experience in the healthcare and fitness industries, didn't always make his own health a priority. As a bureaucrat for one of the largest companies in the country, he was good at his job, but he wasn't taking care of himself, or

his family, the way he wanted to. That all changed for the better with Orangetheory.

"Not everyone has the option of changing careers mid-life," says Randall. "This is my way of helping people take a little bit better care of themselves, whatever their schedule is. If they only have a few hours a week to invest in fitness, it really has to count."

Randall says it's not his own expertise that is the most relevant to Orangetheory. This is an ongoing investigation and any information concerning possible victims and or witnesses is appreciated. Please contact Detective Martin Vega at (951) 871-5796.



care for them, usually surrounding a crisis. Currently, there are not enough foster families to take these children in, let alone mentor them, provide for them, or simply give them hope.

Statistics also show that if nothing were to change from the way it is now, by the year 2020, more than 10.5 million children will spend some time in foster care; more than 300,000 children will age out of the foster care system, some in poor health, some will find themselves homeless, and many will be unprepared for further education or the workforce; and 22,500 children will die of abuse or neglect, most before







This month, my oldest child, Isaiah, turns 16; which is amazing since I am only 29.

This means that he will soon be driving, and that my hold on him is slipping a little further away each day. Soon



he will throw his bags in the car and take himself to practice and bring himself home. He'll get a job and go to work and become more responsible and "man-like."

Every day he gets closer to becoming a grown man, and further from my baby who used to dress up in his Buzz Lightyear costume and zoom around the house. The baby face is gone, replaced with fuzz, and often I am startled by the deep voice that comes out when he talks. He's taller than me, by a lot, and I have to stand on my toes to kiss his cheek. He still loves his momma; he still kisses and hugs me goodbye. And he has grown into such a responsible and overall good kid, but how is it possible he is already 16?

Isaiah came screaming into

this world as we watched the tragedy of the Columbine High School Shooting unfold on TV. He was born on the day of those shootings, April 20, 1999; a horrific day where two teens gunned down their peers, and the world was forever changed. Parents lost their children and I met mine for the first time. I never forgot that, and I have always known he was a gift.

Once I brought my first child into the world and became a momma, my personal world began to rotate around him. From the instant I knew I was going to be a mom, my children have always come first. My sons are the center of my universe, but Isaiah will always be the one who made me a momma first. As a young mom of just 19, I was terrified, but also confident that he and I would go on some crazy adventures together, and we have. He has been my baby, my little boy, my little man, and my oldest son who I lean on to help me with his younger brothers. He watches over them, torments them and leads them. Isaiah has an especially amazing bond with his littlest brother, Nicholas, who is handicapped.

We walked the beach last

weekend, and I watched Isaiah throw his brother on his back so that he could take him to climb the rocks and see the tide pools. He helped him over the rocks, pointed out the shells, signed "water" to him, and held his hand. I watched him hug his little bro, and kiss his cheeks like I always do. As parents, these are the moments we remember; these are the moments that remind us we are doing okay.

It has been a rough year, but Isaiah is getting through it and he's growing as a person. Life is never how you expect it to be or how you plan it to be, it's how God wants it to be. My kids illustrate this to me on a daily basis and I have almost made peace with that. I'm excited to see where his future leads, but nervous to let him fly on his own. Video game talks have been replaced with talks about college and the future, and I know these childhood days are winding to a close.

But, I choose to embrace this season. To really breathe it in and enjoy these moments because soon they will be just memories – and, of course, opportunities to teasingly blackmail him when his future wife comes along.

Three Keys To Hitting

It's been said that hitting a baseball is one of the hardest things to do in sports. You're trying to hit a round ball with a round bat, and the ball is moving in various directions. But, with enough practice and these three keys, you can make hitting easier and be more successful.

#1 – Relax. You must be relaxed while at the plate. If you are tense and concerned with the pressure of getting a hit, it will be difficult. Besides, a relaxed muscle will fire quicker than a tense muscle, and a relaxed mind is a clear mind. See the ball, and hit it!

#2 – Balance. Being balanced during your swing is a critical component to hitting. Watch the best hitters in the game: when they swing and miss, they are still balanced. A good way to work on your balance is to take a swing and hold it when you're finished. If you can "pose" after your swing, you are balanced. Swing hard enough to stay balanced in your finish.

#3 – See The Ball. You have to be able to see the ball out of the pitchers hand. Work on finding the ball the instant before the pitcher releases it. You can practice this while on deck or in the dugout. This is an overlooked aspect of hitting and by far the most critical. Don't follow the ball from the glove to release. Look at the pitcher's hat or have a soft focus over his throwing shoulder, and then pinpoint your focus on the release. Good luck!

are only 43 cows left (a quick count on a recent drive by), and the Leal property at the corner of Limonite and Hamner – with a very cosmopolitan future – is one of the only major acreages still undeveloped in the 13.1 square miles of the City.

Recently, citizens have enjoyed new businesses at the Marketplace at the Enclave (southwest corner of Archibald and Schleisman), including Great Harvest Bread Company, Juice it Up, and Mes Amies Hair and Nails. Still on the brink of opening are Lee's Noodle House, Reflexology Foot Massage and a new Bank of America branch with lanes for drive-through banking.

On the other side of town at

Gateway South (on Limonite, just west of the 15 Freeway), Eastvale's San Antonio Medical Center is putting the finishing touches on its beautiful new building. Although there have been some delays, a soft opening is scheduled for April, with final completion come May.

One of the best bits of news is the addition of a much needed and much wanted new restaurant. Wait for it...Panera Bread is coming to town! Right in the same center with San Antonio Medical Center and 24-Hour Fitness, the bakery-café will be a welcome addition to Eastvale. Panera says, "We are an everyday oasis for our customers," and we agree with them – although we are going to have to wait for Christmas to open this present. It just might be worth the wait.

Walmart is a go, and al-

though still in the planning phases, it is scheduled to break ground where Limonite meets Archibald at some point in the not too distant future.

The biggest project on the horizon is the Leal Master Plan Project. The City of Eastvale is currently cultivating the Vision, Development and Implementation plans, and the mixed-use town center project could possibly be the flagship of the City. More details are forthcoming, and the City will continue to provide updates as they become available.

There are not too many cities around where everything is relatively brand new, and although Eastvale is rich in history, it is bright in its infrastructure. With amazing schools and lot of possibilities forthcoming, Eastvale is truly becoming a destination city.






