Did You Know?

Ways to stay sane caring for an elderly relative

One of the most emotionally complex and difficult things a person can experience is taking care of an elderly parent. I recently spent time tending to my aging, widowed father, and thought I'd pass along these 8 points, each of which I found to be significantly helpful during this phase of my own life.

- Accept that things have changed - When a parent starts in any way depending upon their child, the world has turned upside down. Be prepared for that radically new paradigm. Old roles may not apply; old methodologies may not apply; old emotions may not apply. Be prepared to work from - and write- a whole new script.
- Take it slowly- Taking care of an elderly parent is generally a marathon, not a sprint. Don't rush it. You and they both are in uncharted territory. Let the process reveal itself to you; to the degree that you can, let whatever happens unfold organically. As much as you lead what's happening, follow it.
- Expect nothing emotionally- At the end phase of their life, your parent might open up to you emotionally and spiritually; they might express for you the love that, for whatever reason, they haven't before. But they also might not do that; your parent might even more tenaciously cling to their crazy. It as you care for your aging parent you bond with them in a new and deeper way, of course that's fantastic. But if you're expecting or even hoping for that to happen when you go into caring for them, you will wade into dangerous waters. Better to have no expectations and be surprised, than to have your hopes dashed.
- Expect their anger- When you start taking care of your parent, they lose the one thing they've always had in relationship to you: authority. That's not going to be easy for them to give up. Expect them, in one way or another, to lash out about that loss.
- Give them their autonomy- Insofar as you can, offer your parent options instead of orders. It's important for them

to continue to feel as if they, and not you, are running their lives. Let them decide everything they can about their own care and situation.

- Ask their advice- A great way to show your parent love and respect — and, especially, to affirm for them that they are still of true value to you — is to sincerely ask them for advice about something going on in
- Separate their emotional dysfunction from their cognitive dysfunction- Insofar as you can, through your conversations and interactions with your parent, learn to distinguish between their emotional and cognitive dysfunction. The patterns of your parent's emotional dysfunctions will probably be familiar to you; those, you'll know how to deal with. But their cognitive dysfunction will probably be new to you. Track it; react to it gingerly; discuss it with your parent's health care providers. Mostly, just be aware that it's new, and so demands a new kind of response.
- Pray or meditate- Life doesn't offer a lot more emotionally salient or complex than caring for an aging parent. Accordingly, then, open yourself up to God, whatever that might mean to you. Be sure to get down on your knees regularly, or sit comfortably in a quiet place; close your eyes; breathe deeply and slowly; and wait to come over you the peace that surpasses understanding. What you're undergoing with your parent right now is bigger than you, your parent, or anyone else involved. Do not fail to avail yourself of the great and mighty source from whose perspective it has all, already, been resolved. ■

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History 101

George Washington Gives First Presidential Inaugural Address

On April 30, 1789, George Washington is sworn in as the first American president and delivers the first inaugural speech at Federal Hall in New York City. Elements of the ceremony set tradition; presidential inaugurations have deviated little in the two centuries since Washington's inauguration.

In front of 10,000 spectators, Washington appeared in a plain brown broadcloth suit holding a ceremonial army sword. At 6'3, Washington presented an impressive and solemn figure as he took the oath of office standing on the second balcony of Federal Hall. With Vice President John Adams standing beside him, Washington repeated the words prompted by Chancellor Robert R. Livingston, kissed the bible and then went to the Senate chamber to deliver his inaugural address.

Observers noted that Washington appeared as if he would have preferred facing cannon and musket fire to taking the political helm of the country. He fidgeted, with his hand in one pocket, and spoke in a low, sometimes inaudible voice while he reiterated the mixed emotions of anxiety and honor he felt in assuming the role of president. For the most part, his address consisted of generalities. but he directly addressed the need for a strong Constitution and Bill of Rights and frequently emphasized the public good. He told the House of Represen-

tatives that he declined to be paid beyond such actual expenditures as the public good may be thought to require. In deference to the power of Congress, Washington promised to give way to my entire confidence in your discernment and pursuit of the public good.

After delivering his address, Washington walked up Broadway with a group of legislators and local political leaders to pray at St. Paul's Chapel. Later, he made the humble and astute observation that his presidency, and the nation itself, was an experiment.

Powdered alcohol ban passes test

takes on even more importance.

Powdered alcohol is a freeze dried version of alcohol which comes in a small pouch and is the equivalent of a shot of alcohol. The crystallized formula becomes a cocktail once mixed with water. Although the product isn't sold in stores yet, labeling was approved by the U.S. Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau in 2014.

"The Appropriations Committee concluded that my legislation does not present any significant state cost to taxpayers and I'm happy with that determination." said Senator Huff. "This product must not be allowed to reach store shelves. It presents an array of potential health problems as it can be snorted, added to energy drinks, added to fruit and slipped to unknowing recipients, or even added to beverages already containing alcohol in an attempt to create a dangerously potent concoction," said Senator Huff.

According to a national advocacy group Alcohol Justice, California is the largest alcohol market in the U.S. and suffers the most alcohol-related harm. A 2013 study from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control found that the societal costs for binge drinking are higher in California than in any other state: \$32 billion for one year of excessive alcoholic consumption. Problems caused by binge drinking include lost work productivity, poor health, crime, automobile accidents, property damage and death.

SB 819 has earned the support of numerous organizations, including Alcohol Justice, California Alcohol Policy Alliance, California Council on Alcohol Problems. California District Attorneys Association, California Friday Night Live Partnership, California State Sheriffs' Association, Children's Hospital Los Angeles, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and the Los Angeles Drug and Alcohol Policy Alliance.

The California College and University Police Chiefs Association (CCUPCA), which deals with many alcohol related problems on college campuses, recently weighed in with the following warning:

"Our organization is responsible for the protection of over three million students and employees at the campuses those students attend," the CCUP-CA stated in a letter to Huff's office. "We are already on the front lines of criminal behavior rooted in overconsumption of alcohol and the injection of socalled Palcohol into the campus equation will only exacerbate existing problems."

"I'm personally pleased that this issue has achieved such widespread bipartisan support, including the co-authorship of Senate President pro-Tem Kevin de LeÃ3n," said Senator Huff. "I continue to work closely with Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin (D-Thousand Oaks) on a companion measure that has been introduced in the Assembly, AB 1554. Assemblymember Irwin is also a principal coauthor of my bill," added Huff. ■

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
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



Ray and Margaret came to stay with them. If our kids ate all the food on their plates, they were rewarded by Ray and Margaret with a visit to Dairy Queen and a Peanut Buster Sundae!

When our young family was growing and we needed a room addition, Ray and Margaret loaned us the money to finish the job. Although we did repay that loan over several years, they insisted on providing the floor covering so that our young kids would not be walking or crawling on a cement floor!

One summer we drove across the country and visited their farm in northern Minnesota. We were thrilled to see their family farm, their home and their garden. It sure looked different than the Arizona desert where our family lived.

Ray and Margaret had a firm, unshakable faith in Jesus Christ. In his later years, Ray used to say goodbye like this, "If I don't see you again, I'll see you in heaven."

They were generous and faithful members of our church. I will never forget the time when our church was beginning a new building project. We were committed to pay cash for each phase of construction. At one point, the lumber was scheduled to be delivered on a Monday but we didn't have all the funds to pay at delivery. The church leaders met after the Sunday evening service to pray and discuss what we should do.

During that meeting, there was a knock at the door. A man handed a check to our chairman to cover the remaining amount that was due the next day. That check came from Ray and Margaret! I have never forgotten that moment. It was a wonderful reminder of how God provides through faithful people like this remarkable couple.

I wonder if there have been some people like Ray and Margaret who have impacted your family and your life. were like an extra set of grandparents to our kids.

When was the last time you expressed your thanks to someone who impacted your life as a child, teen, young adult or young couple? Don't wait until it is too late. Write a note, send a card or make a call this week and tell them again how much you appreciate how God used them to enrich your life.

forcement Officer's Memorial in Washington D.C. Additional sheriff and police officials will join the tour to provide support for riders, making this one of the largest law enforcement events in the United States. This year's ride is especially memorable, as it will mark the event's twentieth anniversary.

The Police Unity Tour is the largest donor to the National Law Enforcement Memorial Fund. Last year's event raised over \$1.9 million, which was donated to the National Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial Fund. Since 1997, donations total nearly \$18 million.

Funds received through donations go toward careful and respectful maintenance of the Memorial, which contains the names of over 20,000 fallen heroes. It receives year-round care including re-engraving, coating and sealing of the names, as well as the cleaning of the walls and other memorial improvements.

The Police Unity Tour's motto, which is simply stated, "We Ride For Those Who Died," is just that: Law enforcement personnel joining together to complete a bicycle tour, raising awareness for their professional brothers and sisters who died in the line of duty, and raise funds for the National Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial

and Museum. It was organized in 1997, by Officer Patrick P. Montuore of the Florham Park Police Department, New Jersey, and began with 18 riders on a four-day, fund-raising bicycle ride from Florham Park, New Jersey, to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C. That event raised \$18,000.

The Police Unity Tour – Southern California Chapter VII will have over 400 riders and supporters participating in the event. On May 8, 2016, the group will fly with their equipment to Somerset, New Jersey, where they will begin the three-day, 280-mile journey through Philadelphia, Delaware and Maryland, and complete their circuit in Washington D.C. They will join other law enforcement officers from other Police Unity Tour Chapters across the United States as they ride into Washington D.C. to kick-off National Police Week.

Sheriff Jim McDonnell said, "2016 marks the twentieth anniversary of the Police Unity Tour, and the Department is proud to have assembled its largest group of participants for this noble cause to date. Each mem-

ber has invested hours of training to prepare for the challenging ride, and raised a commendable amount of donations to maintain our nation's memorial for fallen law enforcement officers. Their efforts have raised the public's awareness and appreciation for all law enforcement officers who have paid the ultimate sacrifice to keep our communities safe."

Not So Fast, Not So Furious

From Greased Lighting to Eleanor, street racing has been woven into the fabric of Southern California both in real life and the movies. What is the allure of street racing?

Those involved have said it's an adrenaline rush similar to being on a roller coaster. The only difference is you are safely strapped into a roller coaster that has a beginning and an end. When you mix thousands of pounds of a vehicle with speed, it only takes a second for tragedy to occur. What is the draw for young people to street race even though many admit to the dangers and consequences? For many young people, it's the sense of belonging to a select group, for some it's a way to find some semblance of an identity they long for, and for others it's the thrill of doing something that's on the verge of recklessness.

Street racing is always illegal and extremely dangerous to both participants and onlookers. The California Highway Patrol actively investigates street racing and takes enforcement action whenever possible. The CHP has partnered with several allied agencies to combat the issue of illegal street racing. This partnership has led to arrests, vehicle impounds and citations.

Here are just a few hazards associated with street racing:

- Some people think a vehicle is a toy and when used in this manner it becomes a deadly weapon.
- Street racers often don't wear safety belts and sometimes have been drinking or using illegal drugs.
- Racing should only be done on a dedicated track, not on public

Hacienda Heights couple plead guilty to federal fraud charges

revenue by adding new inves-

Cheong Wha "Heywood" Chang, 48, and Chang's wife, Toni Chen, 47, each pleaded guilty to one count of wire fraud and admitted that they made materially false representations and omissions in order to induce people to invest in a series of Hong Kong-based companies collectively known as CKB. With other names that included WIN168 Biz Solutions, Ltd.; CKB168 Ltd.; and Cyber Kids Best Education Limited, these companies claimed to generate substantial profits from the sale of web-based children's educational courses. The scheme operated from at least September 2012 through at least the beginning of 2014.

Chang and Chen each admitted that made false statements to investors, including: CKB was a successful and profitable business; with each investment of \$1,380, an investor would

receive "Profit Reward Points" (PRPTs) that were worth \$750 and could be exchanged for money; PRPTs would increase in value as a passive investment, even if investors did not actively recruit new investors to CKB or sell CKB courses; and PRPTs were analogous to, or could be converted into, pre-IPO or future shares of CKB that would increase greatly in value when CKB went public. These statements to investors were false.

Authorities have yet to accurately determine the amount of losses suffered by victims in this CKB scheme, but in their plea agreements Chang and Chen admit they received approximately \$2 million as a result of the fraud scheme.

"These defendants defrauded investors out of millions of dollars, and then they attempted to obstruct justice when the Securities and Exchange Commission filed a lawsuit," said United States Attorney Eileen M. Decker. "The fraudulent conduct in this case has

harmed many people, both in the United States and abroad."

Chang and Cheng will face up to 20 years in federal prison when they are sentenced by United States District Judge Dale S. Fischer on February 6, 2017

Three other defendants who are charged in an indictment that was filed last summer – Wen Chen "Wendy" Lee, Daliang "David" Guo, and Chih Hsuan "Kiki" Lin – are scheduled to go on trial before Judge Fischer in November. These three defendants are each charged with one count of conspiracy and 13 counts of wire fraud. The indictment alleges that the defendants collected approximately \$30 million from CKB investors.

An indictment contains allegations that a defendant has committed a crime. Every defendant is presumed to be innocent until and unless proven quilty in court.

This case is the result of an investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Campuses promote college attendance, literacy, biliteracy, collaborative teaching and parent engagement

Baldwin Park - Eight Baldwin Park Unified schools were named California Gold Ribbon Schools on Wednesday for boosting student achievement through programs that promote college, literacy, English/ Spanish biliteracy, collaborative teaching and parent engagement.

Baldwin Park Unified's Central, Charles Bursch, Elwin, Ernest R. Geddes, Foster, Kenmore, Pleasant View and Tracy elementary schools were each recognized.

"Our Gold Ribbon awards are clear and resounding validation of the strength of Baldwin Park Unified's academic Superintendent program," Froilan N. Mendoza said. "A hallmark of all these programs is how they grew from the commitment of our teachers and campus leaders to craft new approaches to meet the needs of all of our students."

The Gold Ribbon is California's highest academic award,

created in 2015 as a substitute to the Distinguished School Program to celebrate schools for model programs during rollout of the new California Standards. The program started last year with middle and high schools. This year, it recognized 758 elementary schools.

Schools applied for the Gold Ribbon program in November 2015. Applications were reviewed in January and site visits conducted through March. Regional award ceremonies will be held in May.

Baldwin Park Unified Winning Programs:

Central Elementary: The school created a STEM Exploratory Laboratory credited with boosting state science scores and student engage-

Charles Bursch Elementary: No Excuses University and Teach Like a Champion programs are raising academic expectations for students and pushing innovation for teachers. They have raised performance for all student groups on the state's previous assessments and its new Common Core-aligned tests.

Elwin Elementary: The school's Heartfelt Parent Engagement Program has increased parent participation in school programs, which in turn has driven improvements in student engagement and achievement.

Ernest R. Geddes Elementary: An emphasis on collaborative teaching has led to early implementation of an instructional intervention program and national recognition for closing the achievement gap.

Kenmore Elementary: A literacy integration program incorporates reading and writing standards across all content areas. Literacy tools have boosted school test scores and sped transition of English learners to fluent English speakers.

Pleasant View Elementary: A No Excuses University program creates collaboration among teachers, parents and students to boost academic expectations. Performance has surged on assessments, putting the school at the forefront of the District.

Tracy Elementary: The school's dual-language immersion program is so popular that students transfer to the district to enroll. Participants test at par or outperform their peers, regardless of demographic challenges.

that followed, including students arrested and booked, while the injured were taken to Kaiser Permanente Hospital in Baldwin Park. Interviews of students and families were also conducted. The assembly ended with a "casket", family speakers and presentation.

The "Every 15 Minutes" program is a massive coordination of resources and it is one of the most impactful programs brought to the Rowland Unified School District, coordinated by its own School Police Department under the direction of Chief of Police, Don Fernald.
