Corona PD Shoot, Kill Suspect in Norco Following Chase

Norco– A man was shot and killed by Corona police in the Norco area following a pursuit Saturday morning.

A second man was arrested and taken into custody. The shooting occurred

Eastvale— In our investigative reporting series of local non-profits accountability, we have requested information and tax records for several area non-profits. Our response from 88 Spirits Foundation, a local non profit who accepts donations from local residents, businesses, and government agencies, was "we are a private foundation and we do not have to disclose where our money goes out to."

According to IRS.gov, this is incorrect. According to the IRS, you have the right to inspect and obtain a copy of a tax-exempt organization's: Annual information returns (e.g., Form 990); Exempt status application materials; and Notice of status under Internal Revenue Code section 527(i).

"All we want to know is where the money goes. We are asking accountability," said Michael Armijo, Editor of City of Eastvale News.com. "Nothing more, just where are you spending the money people and companies are donating. If

they are working with the and if the city is spending money (labor, promotion, direct donations) on the foundation, then they are spending the taxpayers money. If the resident's are donating, where is resident's money going? That's it."

"As you have stated, 88 Spirits Foundation is a 501(c) (3) private foundation, and as such is subject to IRS regulations on all tax-exempt organizations and nonprofit organizations," wrote Anthony Chan, freelance reporter, in a letter to Hari Dihman, listed as the Principal in the 88 Foundation.

The demand letter, which included the formality of content required under the Freedom organizations must be avail-

nizations must also provide Form 990-T for public inspection and copying." The 88 Foundation office personnel stated the opposite, that they were not required to comply and will not produce any documents regardless of IRS code.

According to their Face-book page; "The 88 iMPACT Foundation was built with the hopes of its founding family to create an impactful family legacy. As of April 22, 2014 the long talked about and anticipated 501(c)(3) Non-Profit 88 iMPACT Foundation has been filed & made active. 88 iMPACT Foundation will serve to further

Driveway Blockers Beware

In California, it is illegal to park a car in front of a driveway. According to California Vehicle Code § 22500, "A person shall not stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle... In front of a public or private driveway..." Anyone who decides to park in front of a driveway is subject to towing and citations.



Corona- A man was arrested by the Corona police Wednesday July 26, 2017 for bank robbery in Corona, California.

72 year old Robert Bustamante Flores threatened a teller of the Western Bank on 1050 W. Sixth Street in Corona July 20, 2017. Flores was

suspected of robbery when he went to the police department and police were suspicious and got a search warrant. Corona police searched his home to look for evidence specifically among the rob-

They found about 36 dogs living in his home in the 100 block N. Vincentia Avenue. Flores began to tell the police that he lived in the garage while the dogs lived inside the home. Corona animal control decided to raid the home and found a total of 35 dogs and 7 small puppies.

Animal control officer Bill Sellers explained how he had never seen anything like it and how it was the worst call

at 2:09 a.m. after officers responded to a 911 call regarding an assault with a deadly weapon at a strip club in the 1600 block of East 6th Street, according to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department.

Authorities said the two men were considered suspects in the assault of a victim in the strip club's parking lot.

Officers arrived to find a suspect vehicle with two men fleeing the scene. A chase ensued through the city of Corona.

As the car entered Norco, the driver lost control at West Parkridge Avenue and 1st Street and crashed, the sheriff's department said. The two suspects then jumped out of the car. One ran, while the second produced a handgun.

The suspect that pulled out the gun was shot and killed by Corona police officers. The second suspect was caught and arrested nearby.

No officers were hurt in the incident. The names of the two suspects were not released.

The sheriff's department is leading the investigation. The officers involved in the shooting were placed on paid administrative leave, per department policy.

Officials told CBS 2's Jeff Nguyen a gun was recovered at the scene.


Nguyen also spoke to neighbors who heard the shooting.

Lost Love

I stood there in the courtyard, I waited. Her little eyes, her bright smile, her warm hugs, I was waiting for them all. It would be just a few minutes before that bell would ring, it would be just a few minutes before my little love of life would run out smiling, wrapping her arms around me proclaiming, "Daddy, I love you."

The bell rang and I stood there. I watched. I waited. I sought her out, but she didn't show. Hundreds of kids ran by and I made eye contact with each and every one of them. There wasn't a chance in life that she would've gotten by me. My mind knew what she looked like. what she resembled, any similarities in her characteristics. I was like a machine. scanning the crowd, like a robot with a mission. I was waiting for someone who made my life complete, who I had given my heart to, who I trusted my feelings, my spirit, my life.

After the four hundredth kid passed me by, I felt a sensation of panic. I felt a sense of fear. I was afraid that I had lost one of the only things in life that I trusted, an entity in life that I knew loved me, unconditionally, and who would be there to the end.

When I felt that panic, when I felt the fear of losing someone I really loved, I wondered why? Why did I feel so fearful, why was I so afraid? Why did I feel such a sense of panic? And then I remembered what had happened ...

I remember my mother, my father, my family. I remember how much they loved me, how they took care of me. I remembered giving my eightyear-old heart to those who I thought I could trust. And then I remembered how one day my life changed. I still don't recall how, and I still can't understand why. But for some strange reason, when I was growing up, my life was filled with love and joy, and then one day it was all taken away. All that I knew as a child, all that I trusted, was ripped from my heart, and then ripped from my soul. And no

one explained to me why.

After the inconsistency of that environment, I found new love from girlfriends in high school. And then they too, like my family, left me, and took parts of my heart with them. I remember, at 16 years of age, standing in the aisle of Sav-on stocking shelves, while tears poured from my eyes. I was hurt, I was devastated, I was alone. Again, someone whom I gave my heart to had taken a piece of my inner self. And again, they left without a word.

It took so long for me to love again, to fully trust people, but somehow I did. I began to give my heart, or what was left of it, to others whom I felt I could trust. I slowly began to rebuild my life, and finally I had. Or so I thought...

The way I felt that day when I couldn't find my daughter, that sleeping giant of fear woke up and looked around. I remembered the pain, and the sorrow of how I felt, I remembered how much love hurt. I guess that when I waited for her, those feelings of abandonment returned, and I was so afraid of losing yet another love in my life. I didn't have much heart left to lose, I couldn't stand to go through what I had experienced so many times, and so many years ago. But I faced those demons of fear and abandonment and grew from my pain. I simply refused to let my past interfere with my future. I've worked too hard to let irresponsible acts of yesterday interfere with what I've built today. That day, I found my daughter, and I faced my fears.

And as each day passes, I thank God for the opportunity to feel feelings and emotions that some people will never feel. I thank God for being able to enjoy my life with a smile and a hug. More importantly, I thank God for allowing me to understand that someday I may lose the ones I love, but not to fear, because today is the day I enjoy their presence, their love, and their joy. And when they're gone, I still have wonderful memories that I will make today, so that I can remember tomorrow. And some day. I know God will give the world a beautiful place in their soul, like he has given me. A place that sits in my heart free from past pain, free from fear and abandonment, and free from lost love.

History 101

August 9, 1969: Manson cult kills five people

On this day in 1969, members of Charles Manson's cult kill five people in movie director Roman Polanski's Beverly Hills, California, home, including Polanski's pregnant wife, actress Sharon Tate. Less than two days later, the group killed again, murdering supermarket executive Leno LaBianca and his wife Rosemary in their home. The savage crimes shocked the nation and, strangely, turned Charles Manson into a criminal icon.

Manson was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1934 to an unwed 16-year-old mother. He spent much of his childhood in juvenile reformatories and his early adulthood in prison. After his release in 1967, Manson moved to California and used his unlikely magnetism to attract a group of hippies and set up a commune, where drugs and orgies were common, on the outskirts of Los Angeles.

Manson preached his own blend of eccentric religious teachings to his acolytes, who called themselves his "Family." He told them a race war between blacks and whites was imminent and would result in great power for the Family. Manson said they should instigate the war by killing rich white people and trying to make it look like the

work of blacks.

Roman Polanski (Rosemary's Baby, Chinatown, The Pianist), was not the cult leader's intended target. Manson, an aspiring musician. chose the Polanski house because he had once unsuccessfully tried to get a recording deal from a producer who used to live there. Polanski was out of town at the time of the murders, but his wife and her friends, including coffee heiress Abigail Folger, were shot or stabbed to death. Manson stayed out of the Polanski house on the night of the crime and didn't take part in the LaBianca killings either. However, he would later be charged with murder on the grounds he had influenced his followers and masterminded the crimes.

After initially eluding police prison.

suspicion, Manson was arrested only after one of his followers, already in jail on a different charge, started bragging about what had happened. Manson's subsequent trial became a national spectacle, in which he exhibited bizarre and violent behavior. In 1971, he was convicted and given the death penalty; however, that sentence became life behind bars when the California Supreme Court overturned the death penalty in 1972.

Manson has been the subject of numerous movies and books, including the best-seller Helter Skelter (the title is a reference to a Beatles' song of the same name, through which Manson believed the group was sending secret messages to start a race war). Manson remains in a California

develop, support, educate, and create resources for all Small Business & Public Safety Agencies (i.e. Law Enforcement & Fire Fighters)." Their goal is to support the people that make our communities thrive economically & keep families, homes, and our businesses safe.

"Under the California Public Records Act § 6250 et seq., I hereby request to inspect or obtain copies of public records of 88 Spirits Foundation's annual tax returns for 2014, 2015, and 2016 including: Form 990, Form 990-EZ, Form 990-PF, Form 990-BL, Form 1065, and Form 990-T," the Chan's letter stated.

"The California Public Records Act requires a response within ten business days. If access to the records I am requesting will take longer, please contact me with information about when I might expect copies or the ability to inspect the requested records," Chan wrote.

For exemption application materials, a community member is entitled to inspect or receive a copy of the organization's exemption application (Form 1023, 1024, or other document required to be filed), any papers filed in support of the application and any determination letter issued by the IRS with respect to the application.

Nonprofits are required to file IRS Form 990 must allocate their annual expenses into three categories: 1.program expensesexpenses directly related to carrying out your nonprofit's mission. 2. administrative expenses—expenses for your nonprofit's overall operations and managementfor example, costs of board of directors' meetings, general legal services, accounting, insurance, office management, auditing, human resources, and other centralized services, and 3. fundraising expenses-including costs for publicizing and conducting fundraising campaigns, maintaining donor mailing lists, conducting special fundraising events, and any other activities that involve soliciting contributions. The IRS does not require that nonprofits spend any particular portion of their income on each category. It just wants nonprofits to report how they spend their money, according to nolo.com.

Failure to comply with public disclosure requirements can result in "a maximum penalty of \$10,000 for each failure to provide a copy of an annual information return.", according to IRS. gov.


Although it might cause problems for the offending driver, residents are justified in reporting blocked driveways because it is simply against California Vehicle Code. ■



he had ever received. They had to put one off the dogs to sleep due to his severe wounds while most of the dogs were found with multiple diseases. They explained the home as "destroyed" with demolished furniture and animal waste left on the floors. The dogs were all neglected and were not being properly fed and hydrated. Thankfully, Corona Animal Shelter was able to take all 36 dogs and are currently being taken care of and supervised. Flores was arrested for the charge of Robbery and his bail is \$30,000 while the animal cruelty investigation is still ongoing.

to make your windows visible to birds in a way that won't disrupt your view outside your window is by applying UV decals and UV liquid to your windows. Consider those from WindowAlert, which are proven to effectively alter the flight path of birds and prevent window strikes. While the ultraviolet coating will look like etched glass to you, it will be quite visible to birds. For best application techniques, visit windowalert.com.

• Monitor the Cat: If you have cats that like to spend time outdoors, be sure to monitor them to prevent bird hunting. If possible, consider keeping birds safe by creating an outdoor area for your cat to roam that's enclosed. If you're handy, you may try building this area yourself, but keep in mind, read-made structures are widely available, too.

With a few simple steps, you can convert your garden and yard into a veritable safe haven for birds. ■







Mandatory year-round water-use conservation practices include but are not limited to:

- Irrigate only between 8 p.m. 8 a.m. for no more than ten minutes per day per station.
- Limit irrigation to no more than 4 days per week.
- No irrigation during & within 48 hours of rain.
- Use a shutoff nozzle to wash vehicles.
- Eliminate irrigation run-off.
- Repair all leaks.
- No hosing down of driveways, sidewalks, or other hard surfaces.
