WHY LIVE IN DIAMOND BAR?

The first fact about Diamond Bar is that it is definitely considered one of the gems of the San Gabriel Valley. With extremely high ratings in many categories, including #70 as the BEST PUBLIC SCHOOL SUBURBS IN CALIFORNIA, and Diamond Bar High School is ranked #42 BEST HIGH SCHOOLS IN CALIFORNIA the city also holds one of the highest incomes per household in the entire San Gabriel Valley. The crime rate is extremely low for a Los Angeles suburb. These

facts can be found at Money Magazine's Best Places to Live and online at Census.gov.

A few facts about Diamond Bar: the city is a quiet suburb nestled between Walnut, Chino, and Chino Hills. Diamond Bar residents are affluent young families and commuters. With a population of 56,793 according to Census Bureau 2016 estimates, Diamond Bar is a moderately sized suburb- just 5,000 less than Eastvale's population estimates.

From 2010 to 2016, Diamond Bar's population grew 9.7%- not far behind Eastvale the newest and fastest growing city in the region. For comparison, Eastvale's population grew 13.9% and Corona's grew 9.4% in the same period. This could be attributed to the city's desirable location, great schools, and quiet yet active lifestyle that is great for raising

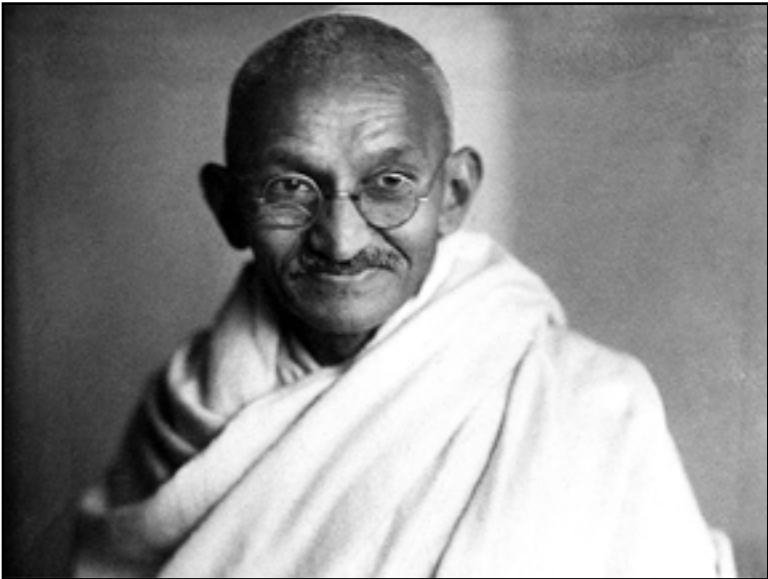

September 16, 1932: Gandhi begins fast in protest of caste separation

On this day in 1932, in his cell at Yerovda Jail near Bombay, Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi begins a hunger strike in protest of the British government’s decision to separate India’s electoral system by caste.

A leader in the Indian campaign for home rule, Gandhi worked all his life to spread his own brand of passive resistance across India and the world. By 1920, his concept of Satyagraha (or “insistence upon truth”) had made Gandhi an enormously influential figure for millions of followers. Jailed by the British government from 1922-24, he withdrew from political action for a time during the 1920s but in 1930 returned with a new civil disobedience campaign. This landed Gandhi in prison again, but only briefly, as the British made concessions to his demands and invited him to represent the Indian National Congress Party at a round-table conference in London.

After his return to India in January 1932, Gandhi wasted no time beginning another civil disobedience campaign, for which he was jailed yet again. Eight months later, Gandhi announced he was beginning a “fast unto death” in order to protest British support of a new Indian constitution, which gave the country’s lowest classes—known as “untouchables”—their

own separate political representation for a period of 70 years. Gandhi believed this would permanently and unfairly divide India’s social classes. A member of the more powerful Vaisya, or merchant caste, Gandhi nonetheless advocated the emancipation of the untouchables, whom he called Harijans, or “Children of God.”

“This is a god-given opportunity that has come to me,” Gandhi said from his prison cell at Yerovda, “to offer my life as a final sacrifice to the down-trodden.” Though other public figures in India—including Dr. Bhimrao Ramji Ambdekar, the official political representative of the untouchables—had questioned Gandhi’s true commitment to the lower classes, his six-day fast ended after the British government accepted the principal terms of a settlement between higher caste Indians and the untouchables that reversed the separation decision.

As India slowly moved towards independence, Gandhi’s influence only grew. He continued to resort to the hunger strike as a method of resistance, knowing the British government would not be able to withstand the pressure of the public’s concern for the man they called Mahatma, or “Great Soul.” On January 12, 1948, Gandhi undertook his last successful fast in New Delhi, to persuade Hindus and Muslims in that city to work toward peace. On January 30, less than two weeks after breaking that fast, he was assassinated by a Hindu extremist on his way to an evening prayer meeting. ■

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

Recipes:

Creamy Dill Chicken

with Roasted Potatoes and Green Beans

BY HELLO FRESH

Cooking Time: 30 mins

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- Dill- ¼ oz
- Yukon Gold Potatoes- 24 oz
- Chicken Breasts- 24 oz
- Green Beans- 12 oz
- Sour Cream- 4 tbsp
- Chicken Stock Concentrate- 2
- Chipotle Powder- 1 tsp
- Dijon Mustard- 2 tsp

1 PREHEAT AND PREP. Wash and dry all produce. Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Pick fronds from dill; discard stems. Finely chop fronds. Cut potatoes into ½-inch cubes. TIP: A wood cutting board is a dependable foundation for your slice work and gentler on knives, too. Get one at HelloFresh.com/Shop.

2 ROAST POTATOES. Toss potatoes on a baking sheet with a drizzle of oil and a pinch of salt and pepper. Roast in oven until crisp and browned, 22-25 minutes, tossing halfway through.

3 COOK CHICKEN. Heat a drizzle of oil in a large pan over medium heat. Pat chicken dry with a paper

towel. Season all over with salt and pepper. Add to pan and cook until no longer pink in center, 4-6 minutes per side. Remove chicken from pan and set aside to rest.

4 ROAST GREEN BEANS. While chicken cooks, toss green beans on another baking sheet with a drizzle of oil and a pinch of salt and pepper. Roast in oven until tender, 10-12 minutes.

5 MAKE SAUCE. Stir together 1 tsp dill, sour cream stock concentrate, 1 tsp mustard (we sent more), and 2 TBSP water in pan used for chicken over medium heat. Season with salt and pepper. (TIP: If sauce seems thick, add more water, 1 tsp at a time, until it has a drizzly consistency.) Remove pan from heat.

6 PLATE AND SERVE. Thinly slice chicken, then divide between plates along with potatoes and green beans. Drizzle sauce over everything. Garnish with remaining dill (to taste). ■

I didn't know what the special glasses might cost, but I was getting desperate. We had traveled half way across the country to see the eclipse. I was prepared to pay any price to get at least one pair of glasses.

Finally, I asked two police officers if they knew where I could buy a pair of the eclipse glasses. I shared my story of how we had looked all over Des Moines but we were unable to find any. They had the same answer that I had heard all morning - "no".

But, as we were talking, I noticed a man and woman standing nearby listening to our conversation. As I got ready to move on, they spoke up and said that they had an extra pair of the eclipse glasses!

They had brought 3 pairs with them, but only needed two. Before I could even ask how much they cost, the couple handed me the glasses that they didn't need. Charge, Robert Wemyss in a statement. “Protecting the ability to use the mail in a safe and secure manner is at the core of the Postal Inspection Service’s mission,” he added.

“Mail theft and other property crimes are a rising problem and trend in this region,” said Corona Police Department Chief of Police Michael Abel. “We take these matters seriously and truly appreciate the joint cooperation in this prosecution. It’s important that we hold suspects such as these accountable for their actions.”

Local Police has already arrested five individuals for mail theft earlier this summer. The Riverside County Sheriff’s Department has also issued a news release with the following tips on how to protect your mail from thieves:

Use the letter slots inside your post office for your mail or personally hand it to a letter carrier.

Don’t leave your mail in your mailbox overnight. Pick it up promptly after delivery. If you’re expecting checks, credit cards or other negotiable items, ask a friend or neighbor you trust to retrieve your mail.

If you don’t receive a check or other valuable mail you’re expecting, contact the issuing agency immediately, without delay.

If you change your address, immediately notify your Post Office and anyone with whom you do business through the U.S. mail.

Don’t send cash in the mail.

Tell your Post Office when you’ll be out of town, so they can hold your mail until you return.

Report all suspected mail thefts to the Sheriff’s Department and a Postal Inspector.

Consider starting a neighborhood watch program. Exchanging work and vacation schedules with trusted neighbors and

friends, you can watch each other’s mailboxes (and homes).

Consult with your local Postmaster for the most up-to-date regulations on mailboxes, including the availability of locked centralized or curbside mailboxes.

The Riverside County Sheriff’s Department also reminds residents that if you witness a mail theft in progress, immediately contact the Riverside County Sheriff’s Department at 951-776-1099 and report the incident. Afterwards, contact the Postal Inspectors at 877-876-2455.

In addition, if you are a victim of mail theft and your mailbox has been vandalized, the City of Eastvale is not one of the numbers you should call.

“The cluster mail boxes are not City property, nor do we pay for the repairs or maintenance,” said Daniella Badaeu, when she was the Eastvale Public Information Officer. “They are the responsibility of the individual homeowner(s) and the HOAs.”

If you do not have a Home Owner’s Association (HOA), you can also call the PMG Mailbox at (951) 288-3129 to repair or replace a mailbox. Some residents have even suggested to pitch in for a heavy duty mail box so it would be less likely for thieves to break into with pry bars or cutting tools.

Another resident suggested to ask PMG Mailbox to seal the outgoing mail slot to prevent thieves from stealing outgoing mail.

However, many residents are wondering why the U.S. Postal Service doesn’t pay to replace the new mailbox. NBC News reported that the U.S. Postal Service says covering replacement costs is financially unfeasible because they are not tax-dollar supported. The Postal Service said they support themselves with what they sell, just like any other business.

Having your own individual mailbox is also not an option

because the Postal Service recently “phased out individual mail delivery in new housing communities as part of ongoing budget cuts,” according to NBC. “Doorstep delivery costs the USPS about \$353 per address each year, while delivery to [cluster mailboxes] costs about \$160 per address.”

Cluster Mailbox Theft/Security FAQ

Who is responsible for our mailboxes and cluster mailboxes?

The mailboxes and cluster mailboxes used throughout the city are federal property under the United States Postal Service (USPS). They are controlled by the United States Postal Service, a branch of the federal government.

What should I do if my mailbox is broken into?

If you see a crime in progress or you suspect a mailbox break in is occurring, please call the Eastvale Police Department (Riverside County Sheriff’s Department), 911 emergency line. If the crime has already occurred please call the Eastvale Police Non-Emergency line at (951) 776-1099 AND the Postal Inspectors Office by calling (877) 876-2455 or visiting <https://postalinspectors.uspis.gov> to alert them of the break-in. It may also be helpful for

you to alert your neighbors and your Home Owners Association (where applicable).

Why report mailbox break-ins?

Reporting mailbox break-ins, theft, or vandalism is incredibly important for prevention of future damage. The reporting to the Eastvale Police Department (Riverside County Sheriff’s Department) is critical for crime data, statistics and prevention. Damage to mailboxes or cluster mailboxes may delay mail delivery by the USPS. It may be helpful to have your neighbors and your Home Owners Association report break-ins as well.

Who is responsible for the mailboxes being repaired?

For developments that have a Home Owners Association (HOA) that includes coverage of the cluster mailboxes, the HOA will be the responsible party. For developments that pre-date the City’s incorporation in October 2010 and those that do not have a HOA that is responsible for the cluster mailboxes, the maintenance and repairs fall on the property owner whose mailbox is located on the respective cluster. The repairs must be coordinated and paid for by the responsible HOA or in collaboration with all the homeowners whose mailbox is located on the respective cluster. Per the USPS, contacting

the US Postal Service, (800) 275-8777, prior to modifying or installing any mailbox equipment is mandatory.

The US Postal Service neither recommends nor endorses any particular equipment vendor.

How can I help?

The Postal Inspectors Office is asking people not to confront criminals directly as they may be dangerous. Rather, they are asking folks to try and get any form of identification (such as a license plate, vehicle description, photograph, or video footage) and report it to the Eastvale Police Department (951-776-1099) and to the Postal Inspector at (877-876-2455) as soon as possible. If the crime is in progress, call 911.

Citizens are encouraged to talk to neighbors and get involved or start a neighborhood watch program. Think strategically and talk to the neighbors in close proximity to the mailboxes who may be home during the day, willing to assist with video surveillance monitoring, or assist with keeping the area well lighted and clear of brush. If an HOA is applicable, ask them to help with preventative measures around the mailboxes ■

children.

Diamond Bar residents are young but not too young with 21.4% under 18 years old and 4.3% under 5 years old. Chino Hills, another relatively young city, has 27.1% under 18 years old and 5.8% under 5 years old.

Diamond Bar is also increasingly diverse with 33.2% white, 20.1% Hispanic or Latino, 4.1% black, 0.3% American Indian and Alaska Native, 52.5% Asian, .2% Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander, 3.9% two or more races.

ing these pictures because we are looking for help to ID these suspects". The suspects are described as two male blacks in their early 20's, they were wearing sweat suit outfits with hoodies.

California Penal Code 459 PC (burglary) is a felony and the potential consequences include a sentence of two, four or six year prison terms.

Penal Code 459 PC reads "Every person who enters any house, room, apartment, tenement, shop, warehouse, store, mill, barn, stable, outhouse or other building, tent, vessel ... with intent to commit grand or petit larceny or any felony is guilty of burglary.

California first-degree (residential) burglary is a felony. The potential consequences include a state prison sentence of two (2), four (4) or six (6) years.4 Penal Code 459 PC reads :

"Every person who enters any house, room, apartment, tenement, shop, warehouse, store, mill, barn, stable, outhouse or other building, tent, vessel... with intent to commit grand or petit larceny or any felony is guilty of burglary."1

Under Penal Code 21a PC, you could be convicted of an attempted crime in the California criminal court process if both of the following are true:

1. You specifically intended to commit a certain crime; and
2. You performed a direct (but ineffective) act toward committing that crime.1

Many people are surprised to learn that they can be convicted of "attempt" even if they changed their minds about committing the crime and voluntarily abandoned further efforts to complete it.2

As a general matter, if you are convicted of an attempted crime in California, you will face a prison/jail sentence that is half as long as the sentence you would have received if you had been convicted of the underlying offense.3

This is true regardless of whether you are convicted of an attempted California misdemeanor or an attempted California felony.4

California robbery in the first degree is any robbery where any of the following is true:

1. The victim is a driver or passenger of a bus, taxi, cable car, streetcar, trackless trolley, subway, or other similar transportation for hire;
2. The robbery takes place in an inhabited house,

- boat, or trailer; or
3. The robbery takes place while or immediately after the victim uses an ATM.23
- A house or structure is "inhabited" if someone lives there and either is present, or has left but intends to return.24
- First-degree robbery in California is punished as a felony. The potential sentence and other consequences include:
- Felony (formal) probation;
 - Three (3), four (4) or six (6) years in California state prison; and/or
 - A fine of up to ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).25
- BUT, if you commit first-degree robbery in an inhabited structure, in concert with two
- (2) or more other people, then the potential state prison sentence for PC 211 robbery increases to three (3), six (6) or nine (9) years.26

2.2. What are the penalties for second-degree robbery in California?

California robbery in the second degree is defined by the California Penal Code as any robbery that does not meet the definition of first-degree robbery.27

Robbery in the second degree is punished by the following felony penalties:

- Felony probation;
- Two (2), three (3) or five (5) years in state prison; and/or
- A fine of up to ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).28 ■

tronics, and credit cards in other people's names. The last thing they were able to find was a bag with what can be described as burglary type tools. Rivas was arrested for receiving stolen property and possession of burglary tools. Later at the station during questioning Rivas confessed to stealing the items while working as a housekeep-

er. According to Captain Reyes of the LACSD at the Walnut/Diamond Bar Station, "they have only able to trace one of the victim's credit cards back to them and have not been able to identify the victim's of any of the stolen jewelry or other credit cards". The case was rejected because the LA County District Attorney's office did not approve of the complaint report that was filed and decided not

to prosecute Rivas. Not all arrests or citations result in the filing of criminal charges. In some cases district attorney's office may decline to prosecute or "reject" a case if there is insufficient evidence or if more investigation is required. The statute of limitations for the district attorney's office to file misdemeanor charges is generally one year and they three years to file on most felonies. ■
