### Eastvale Band Wins Battle of Eastvale Budget Adopted, 6.5 Million in Reserves

**EASTVALE - The Eastvale City** Council approved to adopt the City's budget for Fiscal Year of 2018-2019. The budget is completely balanced. Eastvale will continue with intentionality to invest in the community's top priorities, while delivering the best quality services to their residents. Understanding the priorities of the community is crucial when developing a budget. Three different workshops were held as part of the budget preparation process.

These budget workshops were held on April 11, April 25, and

May 23. At the April 11 budget workshop, staff presented projections for the current 2017-2018 fiscal year, as well as estimates for the upcoming 2018-2019 budget year. Also highlighted at the workshop were the Strategic Plan accomplishments to date, the City's current fiscal reserves, and the financial forecast for the coming year as well as major long-term initiatives for the coming years.

During the April 25 Council Meeting, Staff presented infor-

## Water Safety!



### Being safe is like breathing. You never want to stop.

WATCH YOUR CHILD, WATCH THE WATER.

### **Drowning Prevention Tips:**

- Learn life-saving skills. Everyone should know the basics of swimming (floating, moving through the water) and cardiopulmonary resuscitation
- Fence it off. Install a four-sided isolation fence, with self-closing and self-latching gates, around backyard swimming pools. This can help keep children away from the area when they aren't supposed to be swimming. Pool fences should completely separate the house and play area from the pool.
- Make life jackets a must. Make sure kids wear life jackets in and around natural bodies of water, such as lakes or the ocean, even if they know how to swim. Life jackets can be used in and around pools for weaker swimmers too.
- Be on the look out. When kids are in or near water (including bathtubs), closely supervise them at all times. Because drowning happens quickly and quietly, adults watching kids in or near water should avoid distracting activities like playing cards, reading books, talking on the phone, and using alcohol or drugs.

### Abandoned Baby Found Dead in Corona

**Corona** - Corona Police reported that an abandoned infant was found dead in the city of Corona

The baby was found in the area of Cajalco Road and Interstate 15 on Friday afternoon, according to police. The call came in and officers were dispatched to the scene at 2:36 p.m.

When the officers arrived, the infant was already deceased according to the authorities. The cause of death is still being investigated but won't be known until an autopsy has been been performed.

The investigation into the child's death is ongoing and anyone with information is asked to contact Detective

Mario Hernandez at 951-279-3659 or email Mario.Hernandez@CoronaCA.gov.

Corona police have said there are several "Safe Surrender Sites" where parents can safely surrender an infant within 72 hours of birth — no questions asked. Those places include hospitals, fire stations and police departments.

The safe surrender law allows a parent or legal guardian to confidentially surrender an infant, three days old or younger, to any hospital emergency room or other designated Safe Surrender site. As long as the baby has not been abused or neglected, the person may surrender without fear of arrest or prosecution for child abandonment.



### How Many Americans are Finding Affordable Housing

### **STATEPOINT**

With the cost of housing continuing to rise faster than wages, it's no wonder that many Americans nationwide are struggling to make ends meet. Luckily, solutions already exist to address the affordable housing shortage, say experts.

For example, more than 22 million people in the U.S. now live in manufactured housing -- homes built to a federal standard in factories and placed on a homeowner's land or on rented lots in manufactured home communities, according to the Manufactured Housing Institute (MHI). In many parts of the country, homes like these are the least expensive kind of housing available without a government subsidy. The cost to buy a manufactured home averages about \$70,600, compared with \$286,000 for a single-family sitebuilt home, not including land

In response to growing market demand, almost 93,000 new manufactured homes were built in the U.S. in 2017, an approximate 15 percent increase over 2016, according to MHI, but this is still not nearly enough to meet the nation's affordable housing needs, according to experts. Advocates say that zoning restrictions and other rules and regulations in many areas are preventing manufactured housing from closing the gap -- as certain jurisdictions only allow manufactured housing in locations far from town centers and other jurisdictions have considered banning them altogether.

"Part of this bias may be based on the negative stereotype of earlier generations of manufactured housing, however, today, our homes are built with quality construction materials to meet rigorous federal standards for safety, installation and construction," says Richard Jennison, president and CEO of MHI.

What's more, today's manufactured housing includes features that today's homebuyers want, such as luxury bathrooms, vaulted ceilings and state-of-the-art kitchens with energy-efficient appliances. Often situated in communities with swimming pools, playgrounds and clubhouses, they can be a very attractive option for families and retirees seeking affordability. "At a time when there is a great need for high-quality, affordable housing, today's manufactured homes are an effective solution for many American families and communities," says Jennison. ■



"We are taking the best practices of the private sector and utilizing them in a local government application," added Nissen. "This is a really new concept in local government operations. People tend to think funding is available because we get sales tax and property tax dollars, but with the state shifting more and more responsibility down to the local level, taking away funding, and CalPERS pension obligations increasing, all local governments are looking for innovative ways to stretch \$1 and get more out of less. The data allows us to identify operational efficiencies and change our processes to maximize the return and increase efficiency."

The May 23 budget workshop provided in depth discussion on Council goals and priorities; the proposed operational and capital expenditures; and what resources can be appropriately allocated to accomplish these major initia-

Since the City of Eastvale's incorporation in 2010, the City has delivered a balanced budget vear after year while building healthy reserves. The City of Eastvale is proud to deliver a balanced budget again, with an estimated surplus of \$6.5 million-dollars for FY 2017-2018. This surplus comes from \$4.3 million in Vehicle License Free Adjustment Amount (VLFAA) and \$1.5 million in Sales Tax. Eastvale will also have approximately \$35 million in reserves as part of this adopted budget. That kind of reserve is almost unprecedented for an infant City especially with challenges like the end of the "great recession" and losing approximately \$19.3M in Vehicle License Fee (VLF) revenue from FY 2011-

The City of Eastvale will continue to strive for excellence in a conservative yet innovative approach to their budget. The City is also very excited to share that they received a Certificate of Achievement for the FY 16/17 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) from the Government Finance Officers Association. This is the sixth straight year Eastvale has achieved this accomplishment. Eastvale is now beginning our interim audit for FY 17/18, and the City fully intends to make it seven years in a row.


