Diamond Bar- Los Angeles County Sheriff's Homicide Bureau Detectives are still continuing their investigation into the circumstances surrounding a structure fire and death of John and Linda Venti.

Suspect Venti was wanted for the murder of his parents and the arson of their home. Deputies responded and were able to take the suspect into custody without incident. From the condition of the suspect it appears that he has been hiding in the surrounding hills and brush

Fire Safety Tips for California Homeowners

Sacramento – Today's home fires burn faster than ever. In a typical home fire, you may have as little as one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Knowing how to use that time takes planning and practice. Although people feel safest in their home, it is also the place people are at greatest risk fire. Over-confidence contributes to a complacency toward home escape planning and practice.

"As we approach Fire Prevention Week, now is the time to take a look around your home and see where your hidden hazards are," said Chief Dennis Mathisen, California State Fire Marshal. "That means go room by room, and really look closely at where you have items placed, stored, and plugged in. We all can do a better job of reducing our risks by being more fire aware and creating a potentially life-saving escape plan and then practicing it."

Smoke alarms are the eyes and ears to alert people to a fire. Smoke alarms can mean the difference between life and death as working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire in half. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Take the time to plan an escape route for everyone in the home, designating a "meeting spot" outside. What good is an escape route, if no one remembers it? The answer is simple: practice, practice, practice and make it fun! The more often you practice (day and night), the

more comfortable your children will be in escaping, and less likely to hide.

Heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fires during the winter months. Space heaters are the type of equipment most often involved in home heating equipment fires. All heaters need space. Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment. Have a threefoot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters. Purchase and use only portable space heaters listed by a qualified testing laboratory. Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned on a regular basis.

Remember these three easy things when making your home safe:


- Look for possible fire hazards in your home and eliminate them. Are your outlets overloaded? Check the circuit loads of your electrical appliances and devices and unplug when not in use. Inspect your appliance cords. If any are torn, ripped, or damaged in any way, replace them immediately. If a cord or plug ever feels hot, unplug it.
- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm. Know that you may have only minutes to get out if a fire starts.
- Learn two ways out of every room. Exits should be easy to access and free of clutter. After leaving the home, go to your family's designated meeting spot that was created when you set up your home fire escape plan.



December 1, 1955: Rosa Parks Ignites Bus Boycot

In Montgomery, Alabama, Rosa Parks is jailed for refusing to give up her seat on a public bus to a white man, a violation of the city's racial segregation laws. The successful Montgomery Bus Boycott, organized by a young Baptist minister named Martin Luther King, Jr., followed Park's historic act of civil disobedience.

"The mother of the civil rights movement," as Rosa Parks is known, was born in Tuskegee, Alabama, in 1913. She worked as a seamstress and in 1943 joined the Montgomery chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

According to a Montgomery city ordinance in 1955, African Americans were required to sit at the back of public buses and were also obligated to give up those seats to white riders if the front of the bus filled up. Parks was in the first row of the black section when the white driver demanded that she give up her seat to a white man. Parks' refusal was spontaneous but was not merely brought on by her tired feet, as is the popular legend. In fact, local civil rights leaders had been planning a challenge to Montgomery's racist bus laws for several months, and Parks had been privy to this discussion.

Learning of Parks' arrest, the NAACP and other African American activists immediately called for a bus boycott to be held by black citizens on Monday, December 5. Word was spread by fliers, and activists formed the Montgomery Improvement Association to

organize the protest. The first day of the bus boycott was a great success, and that night the 26-year-old Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., told a large crowd gathered at a church, "The great glory of American democracy is the right to protest for right." King emerged as the leader of the bus boycott and received numerous death threats from opponents of integration. At one point, his home was bombed, but he and his family escaped bodily harm.

The boycott stretched on for more than a year, and participants carpooled or walked miles to work and school when no other means were possible. As African Americans previously constituted 70 percent of the Montgomery bus ridership, the municipal transit system suffered gravely during the boycott. On November 13, 1956, the U.S. Supreme Court struck down Alabama state and Montgomery city bus segregation laws as being in violation of the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. On December 20, King issued the following statement: "The year old protest against city buses is officially called off, and the Negro citizens of Montgomery are urged to return to the buses tomorrow morning on a non-segregated basis." The boycott ended the next day. Rosa Parks was among the first to ride the newly desegregated buses.

Martin Luther King, Jr., and his nonviolent civil rights movement had won its first great victory. There would be many more to come.

Rosa Parks died on October 24, 2005. Three days later the U.S. Senate passed a resolution to honor Parks by allowing her body to lie in honor in the U.S. Capitol Rotunda.



The 2018 Insurance Barometer Study published by Life Happens and LIMRA indicates that 44 percent of millennials overestimate the cost of life insurance by five times the actual amount and 42 percent believe they wouldn't qualify. But, in reality, premiums are typically lowest when you're younger, so it's a smart decision to get some coverage, and reevaluate as life changes. For many young adults, student loans and housing costs sit atop the list of financial priorities. Without life insurance, the responsibility for these debts could fall to family members.

Mind the Gap

Just because you signed up for life insurance coverage through your employer doesn't mean you're adequately covered. Scaturro cites LIMRA data that shows that American households currently have a \$200,000 life insurance needs gap. "If 60 percent of people have life insurance and 33 percent of those have group life insurance only, one in five people only have group coverage, which usually doesn't provide enough," he says.

Most employer-sponsored coverage provides either a set death benefit, such as \$50,000, or a multiple of your base income, and many plans aren't portable. That means, without a separate individual policy, it could be costly or too late to get coverage if you leave your job.

So, sign up for your employer's low-cost or free life insurance, but don't stop there. USAA believes you need enough life insurance to replace five years of your income, plus cover all debts. To determine how much coverage you need, take advantage of a free online calculator, like the one provided by USAA at USAA.com/life.

Protect Your Family

Families are especially vulnerable following the death of a primary wage earner. In fact, 35 percent of households would feel the financial impact within a month, according to research from LIMRA. That figure rises to nearly 50 percent at six months. How will your spouse pay for extra child care? Can they afford to keep the house? Will your children's needs be covered?

Experts say that it's important to review your life insurance needs, discuss them with your loved ones, speak to a financial professional and take action. ■

furnishings and can easily swivel to view the monitors.

"This new style of teaching is giving me the ability to check for understanding more frequently than ever before," the teacher said.

"I've definitely noticed that engagement increases." In total, four pilot classrooms at South Pointe are providing 21st century learning environments.

Science teacher Kellie Muragishi now displays laboratory procedures along with examples of scientific phenomena using a projector and multiple viewing screens.

"I love the fact that all of my students have equal access to the information I am presenting," she shared on Wednesday.

There is no front or back of the class in any of these new innovative learning spaces.

"No matter where a child sits, they have a clear view of demonstrations, lecture notes, and homework problems," Muragishi added.

The flexible seating and table configurations also allow students to move around and

work collaboratively according to the needs of each lab activity.

"We're getting to learn in an environment that is not just looking through the textbook," commented 8th grader Dana Yang.

"It's easy to hear instructions and we don't waste time having Ms. Muragishi repeat things over and over again."

Muragishi says the teacher microphone has become a "lifesaver."


