6 Arrested at Eastvale Checkpoint

STAFF REPORTS

Eastvale – On Friday, May 10, at the start of Mother's Day weekend, the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, Jurupa Valley Station, conducted a Driving Under the Influence (DUI) and Driver's License checkpoint. Six people were arrested and 15 Field Sobriety Tests (FSTs) were conducted.

The checkpoint took place between 7 PM and 3 AM on Schleisman Road and Archibald Avenue. After 1,313

vehicles were screened, four people were arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol and two were arrested for driving with a suspended driver's license. A total of 14 citations were issued for driving without a driver's license and six vehicles were stored or impounded.

"DUI checkpoint locations are determined based on reported incidents of impaired driving-related crashes," stated a Riverside County Sheriff's news release. "The primary

purpose of DUI checkpoints is to promote public safety by taking suspected impaired drivers off roads."

"Impaired drivers put others on the road at significant risk," Sergeant Ignacio Robles said. "Any prevention measures that reduce the number of impaired drivers on our roads significantly improves traffic safety."

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department reminds the public that impaired driving is not just from alcohol. "Some prescription medications and

over-the-counter drugs may interfere with driving," stated the release. "While medicinal and recreational marijuana are legal, driving under the influence of marijuana is illegal."

First-time DUI drivers face an average of \$13,500 in fines and penalties, as well as a suspended license.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

City Seeks Funding for Future Projects

Eastvale – The City of Eastvale recently submitted six FY 2024-2025 Congressional Directed Spending and Community Project Funding applications in hopes to fund the future Civic Center and other Eastvale projects.

"If approved by Congress, the City of Eastvale will receive federal funds to support projects that enhance the quality of life

of Eastvale residents," stated a City news release.

The news release also stated: "Through the annual federal government funding process, Members of Congress can request that spending be directed to specific projects within the districts in which they represent. This process is known as the Congressional Directed

Spending (CDS) procedure in the Senate and the Community Project Funding (CPF) request in the House of Representatives. Each year, Senators and Congressmembers encourage state and local government agencies, tribal governments, and non-profits to submit eligible funding requests for projects that benefit communities. Examples of eligi-

ble projects include, but are not limited to, construction of a new health clinic, planning for a flood protection project, renovation of a community center, or purchase of educational supplies."

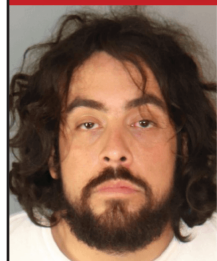

Incident: Homicide Investigation

Date: May 19

Location: Jurupa Valley

Details: On Sunday, May 19, 2024, at approximately 3:54 p.m., deputies from the Jurupa Valley Sheriff's Station responded to a hospital in Riverside regarding a gunshot

victim. Despite lifesaving measures, the victim, a 15-year-old male juvenile, was pronounced deceased.

Responding deputies interviewed witnesses at the hospital and located the crime scene in the 10100 block of Ben Nevis Boulevard in Jurupa Valley. Investigators from the Jurupa Valley Sheriff's Station, Central Homicide Unit, and the Coroner's Bureau were notified and responded to the scene. Investigators from the Central Homicide Unit assumed control

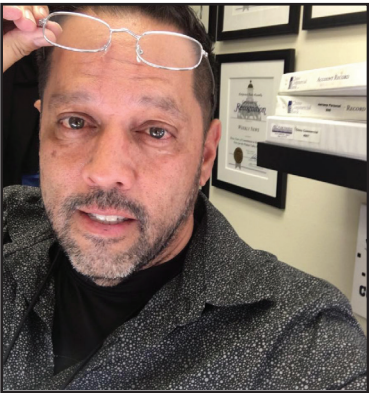

Redemption

One day, my friend told me a story about a freshman in high school named David that touched me so deeply. This is what I call redemption:

David saw a kid named Ron walking home from school. It looked like Ron was carrying home all of his books, which was strange because classes aren't all on the same day. He thought to himself, "Why would anyone bring home all his books on a Friday? He must really be a nerd." But he shrugged his shoulders and went on.

As he was walking, David saw a bunch of kids running toward Ron, knocking his books out of his arms and tripping him. Ron's glasses went flying and landed in the grass. When David handed the glasses to him, he looked up he saw this terrible sadness in Ron's eyes.

Somehow he felt his pain.

David said, "Those guys are jerks. They really should get lives." Ron looked at him and lowly said, "Thanks." There was a slight smile on Ron's face. It was one of those smiles that showed real gratitude. David helped him pick up his books, and as it turned out, Ron lived near David. They talked all the way home and Ron turned out to be a pretty cool kid.

Over the next four years, Ron and David became best friends. When they were seniors, they began to think about college. Ron decided on Georgetown, and David was going to Duke. They knew that they'd always be friends, and that the miles would never be a problem.

Ron became valedictorian of their class, and had to prepare a speech for graduation. David was so glad he didn't have to get up there and speak.

On graduation day Ron looked great. He was one of those guys that really found himself during high school. All the girls loved him. David was just jealous. He could see that Ron was nervous about his speech, so David smacked him on the back and said, "hey, big guy, you'll be great!" He looked at David with one of those looks (that really grateful one) and smiled.

As he started his speech, he cleared his throat, and be-

gan. "Graduation is a time to thank those who have helped you make it through those tough years. Your parents, your teachers, your siblings, maybe a coach...but mostly your friends. I am here to tell all of you that being a friend to someone is the best gift you can give them. I'm going to tell you a story."

David looked at his friend with disbelief as he told the story of the first day they met. Ron talked of the day he had cleaned out his locker. He talked of how he was distraught about his life. He talked about how lonely he was. So lonely, he had planned to kill himself that weekend. But he didn't, because his new friend unknowingly stepped in. He showed kindness. He showed compassion. He showed, by his actions, that life is worth the struggle.

Ron looked hard at David and gave him a little smile. "Thankfully, I was saved. My friend saved me from doing the unspeakable."

David heard the gasp go through the crowd as this handsome, popular boy told them about his weakest moment. He saw Ron's mom and dad looking at him and smiled with that same grateful smile. Not until that moment did David realize its depth.

It was then that David realized how important it is to never


underestimate the power of one's actions. With one small gesture you can change a person's life. For the better, or for the worse.

The most compelling element about the story of Ron and David's friendship is how it relates to so many lives. Personally, I've hoped that somewhere within my past that I've been a "David" to someone I've met. And what fills my spirit with more emotion is that I know I've felt like a "Ron" many times. What perplexes me even more is that I don't know which role I've felt more often.

Someone once said "Friends are angels who lift us to our feet when our wings have trouble remembering how to fly." To so many, each day, this is true. I've always valued my friends with depth and sincerity. I've always believed in the importance of being friends, and the importance of having friends.

As the story continues, it emphasizes that there is no beginning or end. Yesterday is history. Tomorrow is mystery. But today is a gift. This reminds me that giving the ultimate gift of friendship is what I call the inner spirit of your heart that gives us the true feeling of redemption.

Details: On Tuesday May 14, 2024, at 6:09 p.m., a Riverside Sheriff's motor deputy attempted a traffic enforcement stop on Wineville Avenue and Limonite Avenue, Jurupa Valley. The vehicle failed to yield and entered a dirt access road adjacent to 68th Street, west of Pats Ranch Road, firing at the pursuing deputy before entering a dense foliage near the Jurupa Valley Santa Ana river bottom. During the pursuit, the subject abandoned his vehicle and fled on foot in an unknown direction. The initial pursuing deputy did not sustain any

injuries during the incident.

Incident: Fatal Traffic Collision

Date: April 28

Location: Jurupa Valley
Details: On April 28, 2024, at 11:08 a.m., deputies assigned to the Jurupa Valley Sheriff's Station responded to a call of a major injury traffic collision on Jurupa Road, east of Troth Street. Deputies, along with paramedics from Cal Fire, responded and located a severely injured pedestrian lying in the roadway who had been struck by a vehicle. The pedestrian was pronounced deceased at the scene.

The Jurupa Valley Sheriff's Station Traffic Collision Reconstruction Team responded and assumed the investigation,

which is ongoing. The cause of the collision is still under investigation, and it is still unknown if alcohol and/or drugs were a factor. The pedestrian's name is being withheld pending next of kin notification.

The collision investigation required the temporary closure of Jurupa Road between Troth Street and Marlatt Street to process the scene and collect evidence. quests for FY 2024-2025:

- Citrus Reimagined Project submitted to Congressman Calvert for \$750,000
- Eastvale City Hall submitted to Senator Butler for \$8,000,000
- Eastvale City Hall submitted to Senator Padilla for \$8,000,000
- Eastvale Library submitted to Congresswoman Torres for \$6,000,000
- Eastvale Police Station submitted to Congresswoman Torres for \$6,000,000
- Eastvale Public Safety Enhancement Program submitted to Congressman Calvert for \$550,000

If these projects are approved for funding, they will have less of an impact on the city's general fund. But if the requests are not approved, it will not prevent these projects from moving forward, according to the City.

"The City of Eastvale expresses its utmost gratitude to Senator Alex Padilla, Senator Laphonza Butler, Congressman Ken Calvert, and Congresswoman Norma Torres for the opportunity to submit funding requests," stated the news release.

The City also thanked them for their "invaluable assistance and advocacy in support of these funding requests," and ended with "Their commitment to our community is truly commendable."

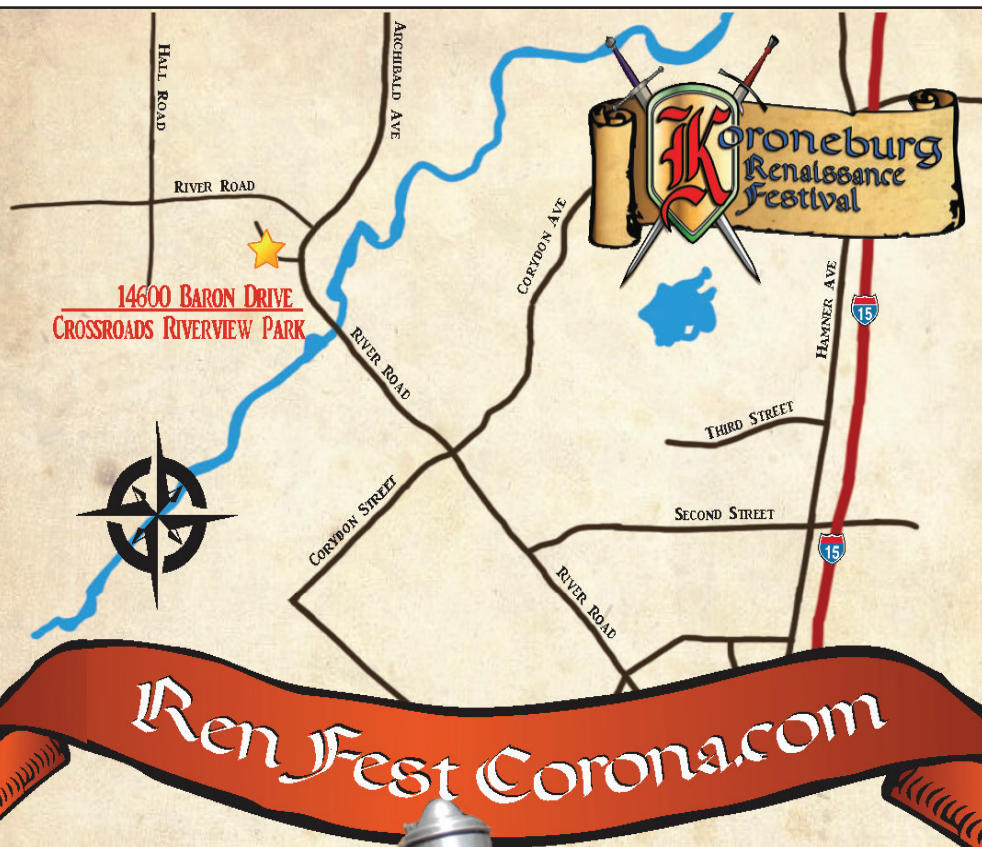

National Click-it-or-Ticket Campaign

Riverside County Sheriff's Department

Eastvale, Jurupa Valley, and Norco – For Memorial Day Weekend, the Riverside County Sheriff's Office reminds travelers to always buckle up and secure children in the right car seats when visiting friends and family.

This year's Click It or Ticket

campaign runs from May 20 to June 2. During this time, the Riverside County Sheriff's Office will have additional deputies on patrol actively looking for drivers and passengers who are not wearing a seat belt. This includes vehicles where children are not secured in child safety seats or the right safety seats for their age.

"Wearing a seat belt should be automatic for all drivers and passengers every trip," Sergeant Ignacio Robles said. "Seat belts save lives, and everyone – front seat and back, child and adult – needs to remember always to buckle up."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration

(NHTSA), nearly 12,000 people killed in crashes throughout the country in 2021 were not wearing seat belts. In California, 878 people killed in crashes in 2021 were not wearing seat belts, an increase of 12.3 percent from 2020.

California law requires a child to be secured in a safety or booster seat until they are at least 8 years

old or at least 4 feet, 9 inches tall. Children under the age of 2 must ride in a rear-facing seat unless the child weighs 40 or more pounds or is 40 or more inches tall.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
